

An amendment to the game and fisheries act was approved last week by the Legislature's committee on game and tish The above amendment brings into effect a law wheters anyone convicted of discharging or cause to be discharged or handles such a firearm or airgun without due care and atten tion, or without reasonable consideration for per mis or prip erty, and is liable to a fine of not more than \$500 or to impri sonment for a term of not more than six months or both


