Protest Asks Replay Of Leamington Game

A protest has been lodged by Georgetown's Bantam hockey team demanding a replay of the second game of the OMHA Ontario semi-finals.

Team manager Jack Gudgeon said earlier this week the irregularities in the officiating had prompted the protest. The second game was played Saturday in Leamington after Georgetown had fallen behind by 2 goals to none in the first encounter here.

The second and final match ended 4-3 in favour of Leamington but if the protest is upheld it won't go into the books that way. Back for the arena was a ten minute misconduct handed Terry Lane midway through the game while Georgetown owned a 2-1 lead. Rules stipulate that when a misconduct is assessed a player early in the second period and the game official must notify that player's bench or the team captain, but the referee Saturday did neither and consequently the entire Georgetown club figured it was a minor penalty.

When the clock showed two minutes without Lane returning the Georgetown coach assumed it was a five minute major. Georgetown played almost six minutes short handed before being told by the official that the penalty was a misconduct, and during that period Leamington scored the tying goal. Georgetown's top players were used to kill off the penalty and were worn out by the extra duty.
