GAS WAR DROPS PRICE!

Dipping gasoline prices are becoming an annual spring special for local motorists.

According to a number of garage operators contacted by the Herald this week the present price war, like those of the immediate past springs, was inevitable and apparently will become a perennial custom enjoyed by thirsty gas tanks for springs to come.

The origin of this particular gas war, however, is something the garage operators are not agreed upon. Some said it came from the Streetsville area while others named Toronto as the starting point and still another pointed to Milton as the source. Prices in Acton have been sub-normal for at least three years.

Currently car owners can buy their petrol at almost any station in town for 34.9 cents per gallon and apparently the descending price has jammed there, and is not likely to go any farther although one station in a neighbouring town is offering regular gasoline for less than 30 cents a gallon.

Some operators are not happy with the war while others couldn't care less. One operator said he simply regulates the price to conform with the next fellow and carries on as usual. Business is not affected by the war as long as prices are uniform and after the normal run of three weeks or so, the cost of gasoline in the motorist returns to what it has been all winter.

Meanwhile motorists can gobble up the standard and high octane, and their multi-termed additives at bargain rates.
