Notable Fan Support In Safari to Barrie

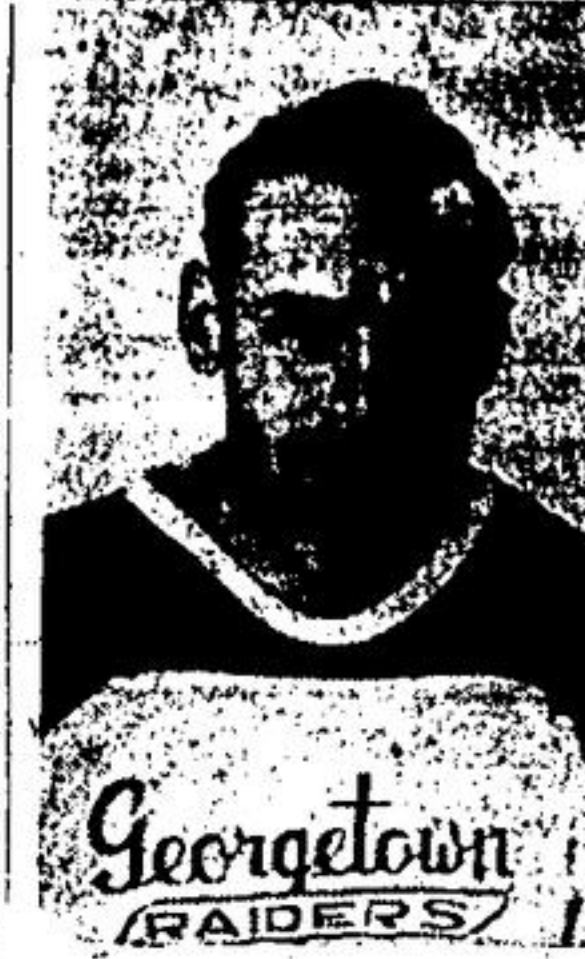
Georgetown Raiders lost a hockey final and won a campaign in Barrie Monday night. Completely disorganized by the Lakeviews and a relentless checking game, Raiders surrendered the contest 6 goals to 2 and gave up the series 3 points to 6 to the Barries who now claim the COHL group championship. They will meet the winners of the current Oshawa - Napanee series.

But while they took a back seat to the Lakeviews in their quest for the group title, the Raiders saw their year long campaign in being the hockey fans back to the game culminate in a heartening calvalcade of Raider backers who made the northern safari.
