Six girls of the "Limehouse Pear-facts" 4H Homemaking Club "Featuring Fruit" have reached the half-way mark of the club.

The meetings are all held at the home of their leader, Mrs. Sydney Kirkpatrick. Mrs. Sam Gishy is her assistant.

The objectives of the club are: (1) to point out the value of fruit; (2) encourage the use of Ontario fruit; (3) teach girls how to choose, prepare, and use fruit.

Many informative and interesting notes have been given and are kept in a record book. Notes have included why we eat fruit, how to use fruit in season, how to buy fruit either fresh, canned or frozen, varieties of apples, how to care for fruit, dried fruits and the importance of a good breakfast. Many new recipes have been tried both at the meetings and at home as a result of the club.

The girls have demonstrated at the meetings making fruit salads, the importance of exact measuring, oven steamed fruit pudding and rhubarb pie.

Cancer Society Provides Practical Assistance

When the priest met the young mother and father at the door of the hospital, they could not imagine why he was there.

Having Treatment
Hours before, they had left their comfortable little home in Northern Ontario in charge of the maternal grandmother who would look after the six young children — five boys and a girl — while their father was having treatment for cancer at the Princess Margaret Hospital in Toronto.

Hopeful
Hopeful about the treatment the father was taking, looking forward to their return within a few days, to their family, they looked at the priest with friendliness as he approached them.

But the news the priest had was tragic. During the night while they were on the train, their only girl and youngest child had died quite suddenly. She had not been very well when they had left, but not seriously enough indisposed; to require the presence of their mother as well as the grandmother.

Now she had died.

Must Return
The mother and father were stunned. In dreadful anguish they turned to the priest. They must return immediately! But how? Trains were infrequent to their home town and they had not enough money in the bank for plane fare.

Called Cancer Society
The priest offered what comfort he could. Nurses at the hospital did all they could, and the social workers called the Cancer Society.

Trip Arranged
Through the immediate work of the Ontario Division of the Canadian Cancer Society, where the office in charge of patient transportation got immediately on the phone to the airlines office, a plane trip back home was arranged for the distraught young couple at the earliest possible moment.

Work of Mercy
While this authentic case is unusual, since such tragedy does not often strike in this way, it is work similar to this work of mercy and comprehension and practical assistance in answer to real need that has made the Cancer Society known to millions across Ontario.

Local Branch
Wherever the financial need is great, wherever a patient requires treatment at one of the Ontario Cancer Treatment and Research Foundation Clinics in Ontario, they are either driven to the clinic by a volunteer worker, or train or plane transportation is provided for them. Arrangements for such transportation are made through the local Cancer Unit or Branch, and the fare is reimbursed by the Foundation.

Many Services
This service is only one of many provided by the Canadian Cancer Society to those suffering with cancer.

Besides the many services rendered by the Society and its vast education programme conducted across the province, the Society also contributes 80% of the enormous amount of money needed for fundamental research in laboratories and universities across Canada to find the cause and cure of cancer.

The Georgetown branch of the Canadian Cancer Society will be blitzing the town on Monday afternoon and evening, April 10th and are asking residents to leave their porch lights on to have a canvasser call.
