 The Georgetown Lions who last year started an annual western type stampede have announced that Rodeo Week this year will be the second week in June beginning on the 5th and ending on the 10th with the gala windup which includes all popular rodeo competitions, square dancing and Bar-B-Qs.

The bull-dogging, bronco riding, calf roping and many other events drew such a large crowd in their first appearance last year that seating facilities couldn't accommodate the spectators. This year, the Lions report, there will be no such problem.

Bleachers already partly constructed will seat 3,500 when completed. More elbow room will also be afforded the cowboys who will have a large oval shaped area ringed by seats directly opposite the grandstand. The additions will make the rodeo area four times as large as last year.
