The Anglican Auxiliaries of the Diocese of Niagara, held their 75th anniversary meetings last week, at Christ's Church Cathedral, in Hamilton. On Wednesday morning the delegates attended the corporate celebration of the Holy Eucharist. The celebrant was the Bishop of Niagara the Rt. Rev. W. E. Bagnall, DD, and he was assisted by the Primate, Archbishop H. Clark of Rupert's Land. Meeting at the Alexandra Auditorium in the afternoon the delegates were officially welcomed by the Primate and Bishop and the President's address was given by Mrs. R. D. F. Bourne, and responded to by Mrs. Bagnall. The Wednesday evening meeting was featured with an address by Mrs. T. O. Wedel, Episcopal Church, Washington, DC. The sessions on Thursday

were addressed by the Rev. Canon A. H. Davis, D.D., General Secretary of the Missionary Society and Mrs. C. R. H. Wilkinson. In the evening a Thanksgiving service of Evensong was rendered to observe the 75 years of WA work in the Diocese and the sermon was preached by Archbishop H. Clark, Primate of the Anglican Communion in Canada. Friday the delegates were addressed by The Most Rev. W. L. Wright, DD, Archbishop of Algoma and Metropolitan of Ontario. The members were the guests of the Lord Bishop of Niagara and Mrs. Bagnall at the Scottish Rite Buildings on Queen Street. Delegations were present from nearly every Parish in the Diocese and over a thousand women jammed the Cathedral Church for the Thanksgiving service.
