SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

The 1961 fishing season is just about upon us, and the first note for the new season is that a new fish sanctuary has been established at Port Severn.

The sanctuary is described as follows: "All that part of Tug Channel in the Twp. of Tay in the County of Simcoe and in the geographic Township of Baxter, in the Territorial of Muskoka, and all that part of an unnamed channel connecting Little Lake and Georgian Bay, west of island 'K' at the mouth of the Severn River in the geographical township of Baxter, lying between the northerly limit of that part of the Queen's Highway known as No. 103 and the southerly limit of the travelled road connecting Port Severn and Honey Harbour."

These waters will be closed to fishing from the 1st of April to the twelfth day of May, both dates inclusive in the year 1961.

The rainbow trout spawning run on the Nottawasaga River is late this year and for this reason protection of the fish sanctuary at the Nicholson Dam is to be strictly enforced. Angling will not be permitted at the Dam until June 1st. The sanctuary extends for approximately a thousand feet along the river above and below the Dam and warning signs have been posted. The rest of the Nottawasaga River, of course, is open to trout fishing during May.

While I'm on the subject of dams, don't forget to give our own dam on River Road a try this spring.

Bob Piatts and myself witnessed a 4 or 5 lb. Brown trout taken from below the dam, not too far down the river. It happened this way: Bob and I were standing on the bridge talking trout when some one asked us where to fish and one of us motioned down river might be good. We were still talking ten minutes later when some chaps came by again, lugging this trout. Well, even with our bottom jaw hanging on the ground, we blurted out: "where did you catch him, what did you use?"

But you know, I think this chap had lost his voice because all he did was smile and kept on walking.

At this time of writing I do not know whether Terra Cotta Conservation area will be open on April 29th due to the fact that there is a chance that some restocking was carried out this spring I will know for sure by my next column.

The dam at Norval is another likely spot for Browns, and anywhere on the Credit River could produce a trout you'd be proud to hang on the wall to show your friends.

The Pine river near Alliston has produced trophy fish as has the Nottawasaga river near Cookstown.

Conservation officers will again be carrying on a fish census this year, so if by chance you are met by one, remember those census are for your good as well as for the fish and wildlife.

To qualify for this award a cow must produce at least 2,000 lbs. of fat in 4 consecutive years.
