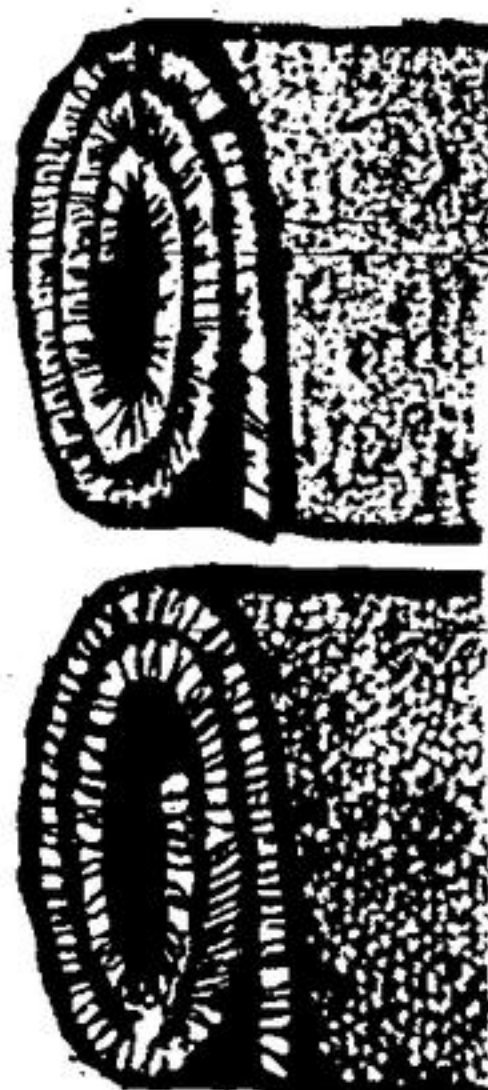
Motor License Bureau Closed April 24 to 28

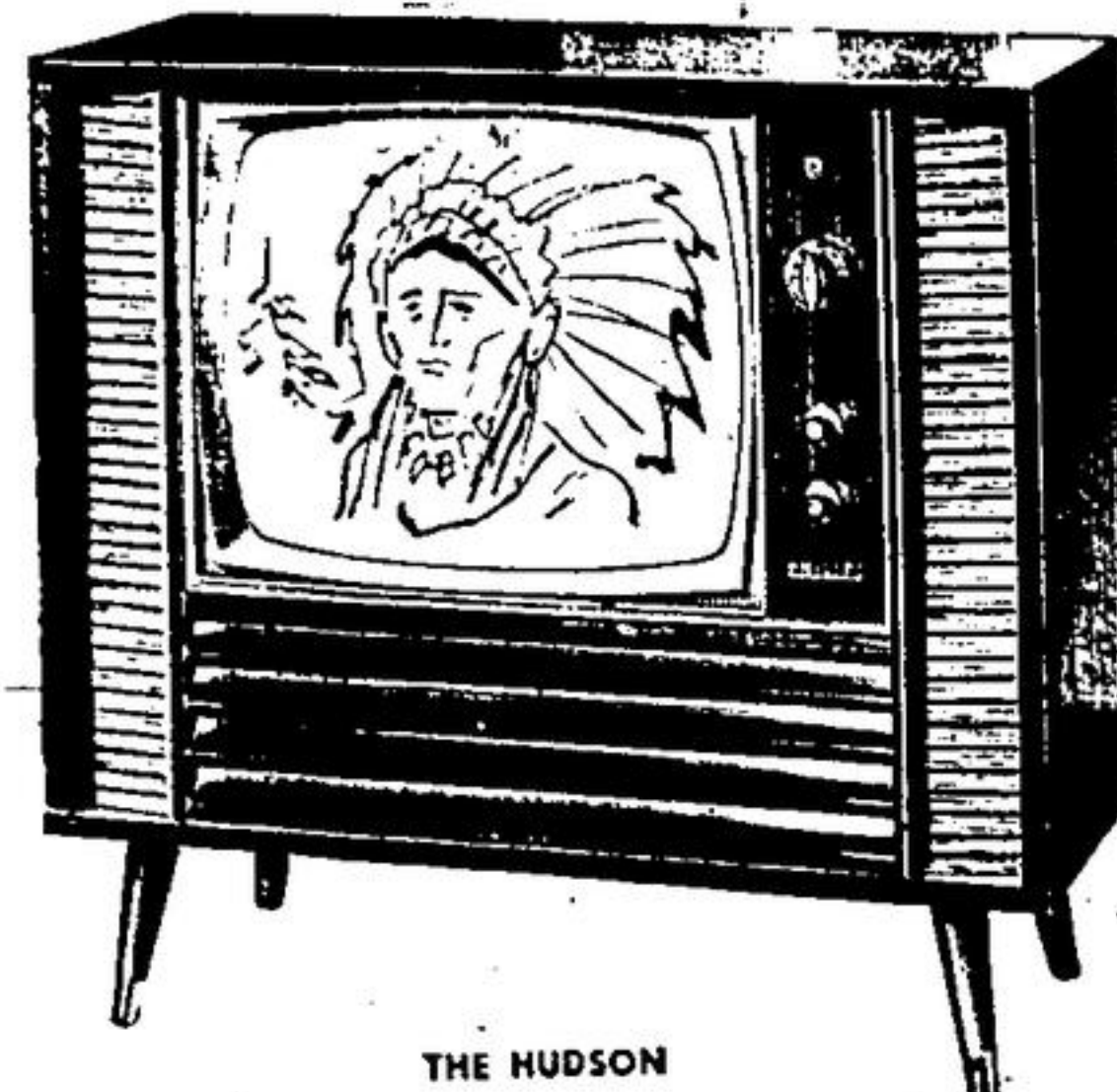
