Harry Binns Greatest Tenor of His Times

Brampton Man Toured With The Dumbbells

One of Canada's best known entertainers of the pre-war era and a pioneer radio vocalist, Harry Binns died suddenly at his home in Brampton last week. He had offered a heart-ful performance on TV Tuesday, March 28.

Considered one of the great tenors of his era in show business, Mr. Binns toured the active stage in 1947, and his wife, the former Alicia (Dollie) Armstrong, opened a restaurant from then until 1952 at the junction of Highways 7 and 10. Harry Binns' Motor Grill displayed highly original menus, borrowing their themes from show business, and illustrated by the celebrated cartoonist, the late Bob Skuce.

Born in England, he entered the entertainment profession as a boy in the Happy Hours Review. He sang with the first show corps in the British Army during the First World War in France, and also served his first military duty in actual combat.

After coming to Canada his first show was with Jack Arthur at the Regent Theatre in the prologue to Charlie Chaplin's picture, The Gold Rush. He sang regularly thereafter at the town, Pantheons (now Imperial), Victoria and Shaws, with such notable performers as Jack Benny and Ted Skelton.

One of the artists on the official opening show of CFIB radio station, he originally broadcast from Ryan's Art Gallery on Jarvis Street, and later from the second floor front of the Heintzman building, Yonge Street, where spectators could watch from across the street.

He was the first tenor to be seen in a group picture in the broadcast. He was recently seen in a group picture in the wall of the present FRB station on Bloor Street.

He sang on the Gooderham and Worts radio station, CKGW, the King Edward Hotel, and as an old original on station KNC where Geoffrey Wadlington played his violin and later became an orchestra leader. He was the first tenor to broadcast from radio station WCA from the old Star building.

He is well remembered as soloist of St. Anne's Anglican Church in Toronto, and so as an RCA Victor recording artist.

The first Imperial Oil hockey broadcasts carried Harry Binns and Luigi Romanelli's orchestra between periods of entertainment.

He joined the Dumbbells Musical Comedy Company (an all male revue with female impersonators) as leading tenor in or about 1924, and toured Canada laying all major theatres, till disbanded in 1932, having "crossed Canada 14 times coast to coast."

For five years, during summer months, he entertained at the former popular Sunnyside merry-makers show on Toronto's waterfront. It is said that when the wind was in the right direction, his magnificent tenor voice could be heard well up to Parkdale (Toronto).

He introduced many of the all popular songs. Siboney, the Lady in Red, and Sweet Mystery of Life, and through the years entertained at all the leading hotels and theatres in Toronto, and filled his engagements throughout Canada and the United States.

Police concerts and Star concerts were a regular commitment for Harry for years. In 1932 he met his wife in Buffalo where they were entertaining on the same show, and subsequently worked together and in the United States still making it a permanent partnership by marrying in 1942.

He has been responsible for the introduction and guidance of show business of many leading entertainers, one of whom was Charlie Chase, was once a member of the Brampton only two weeks. Jackie Rae, now in

England, and countless others have known and benefited from his kindly help.

In 1947 he retired from show business to run a restaurant at the junction of 7 and 10 Highways. Always seeking knowledge, and with a capacity for varied interests from politics to hackneyed puns, he tried his hand at farming, and with some small success was jokingly named "The Wheat King of Number 10."

Although suffering poor health during the last few years, he still took a keen interest in the Brampton Senior Citizens, and whenever health permitted could be relied on to entertain them.

He is survived by his wife, Alicia, a sister Kitty and brother Walter, both of England. The funeral service was held Saturday in Toronto.

By-Law No. 60-11 Town of Georgetown

A By-law to amend By-law No. 57-91, being a restricted area zoning by-law, as amended by By-law No. 59-37, as amended by By-law No. 60-3.

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to amend By-law No. 57-91, as amended by By-law No. 59-37, as amended by By-law No. 60-3.

NOW THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN BY ITS MUNICIPAL COUNCIL ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. THAT the following words are hereby deleted from Section 3.111: "Including signs within a building visible from the street."

2. THAT Section 4.6 (1) is hereby amended by adding thereto the following words: "and except for properly authorized and approved signs."

3. THAT Section 5.1.11 is hereby amended to read as follows: "No signs, other than those provided for by Section 5.1.1A (a) shall be permitted to be hereafter erected in any residential zone, except in the case of an apartment where not more than one building board not exceeding twelve square feet in area shall be permitted, provided that all such signs are located on the lot to which they relate."

4. THAT Section 6.13 (a) is hereby amended by adding thereto the following words: "except that where the building is on a corner lot and has
