Drop Guelph Line Sign On Highway
 In order to eliminate possible confusion and provide better direction, signs in advance of and at the intersection of Highway 401 and what is generally known as the Guelph Line are being revised, it is announced by the Department of Highways.
 The name "Guelph Line" has been found to be confusing to westbound traffic in search of the city of Guelph. The department said the county of Halton has now agreed to have the name of the Guelph Line changed to "Campbellville Road." It is hoped that this change will not be misleading to motorists bound for Guelph, who should turn off 401 at Hwy. No. 6, and at the same time will be indicative of the whereabouts of Campbellville, south of Hwy. 401.
 The new signs will be erected within the next few days.

Mental Health Clinic Serving Halton Well

During the past few years Halton county has been served by a mental health clinic. This is directed by Dr. Roy Brillinger and serves several other geographical areas as well as Halton County. Dr. Brillinger, with his psychologist and social worker, visits Halton county two days each month. Patients with less severe mental illness are seen in this clinic. Many of the patients are children with emotional and behaviour problems. This clinic has served us well in spite of the small amount of time which Dr. Brillinger has been able to give.

Need Increasing
 Halton's needs for mental health services have been increasing for a number of years. The present population is 111,000, of which only 40 per cent is truly rural. The increasing urbanization has brought increased mental health problems. Those patients with serious mental illness are being adequately cared for in the Ontario Hospitals in Hamilton and New Toronto. Our mental defective patients are being adequately cared for in the Ontario Hospital School at Orillia. Local schools for retarded children are accomplishing a great deal also. The staff of all the Ontario Hospitals have been demonstrating a very keen interest in the community as they would prefer.

General Hospitals
 Halton County is now well provided with general hospitals. The Oakville — Trafalgar Memorial Hospital has been in operation for a good number of years. The Milton Hospital has been serving the Milton and district area for several months. The Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital, Burlington, is now in operation, and Georgetown Hospital will be accepting patients within a few months. It is quite evident that there is adequate general hospital facilities in Halton County. Its population is being well served in this field.

Mental Health
 It is most necessary at the present time to set up a mental health program that will promote good mental health in our community, prevent mental illness from occurring, and prevent the less serious mental illnesses from becoming more serious. This can be done to the best advantage by someone working in the community itself. It is necessary to give assistance to a high professional level to those people responsible for the training and development of the younger members of our community in the home, in the school and in the church. These are the basic areas for attacking the problem but there are many other community resources which could be marshalled by leaders with professional training in the psychiatric, psychological, and social fields.

Working Closely
 Much could be accomplished by working closely with practicing physicians, public health nurses, and registered nurses. The official agencies, the courts, and the various welfare services could be given great assistance (and could render great assistance) to a mental health

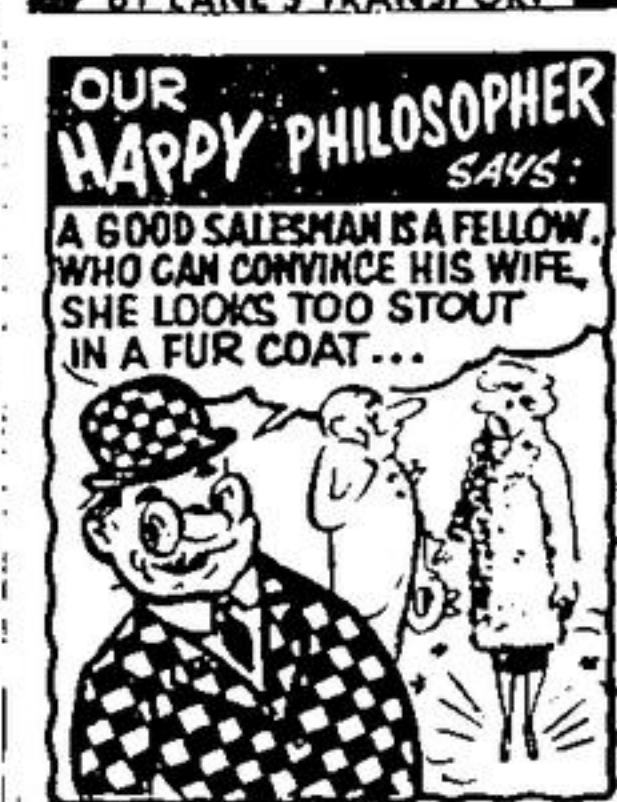
FARM NEWS

DOUGLAS BURNSIDE IS NEW ASSISTANT AG-REP.

 It has been announced that J. Douglas Burnside has been appointed Assistant Agricultural Representative for the counties of Halton and Peel. He will assume his duties in the Halton office, and will work with J. A. Francis, Agricultural Representative.

Douglas Burnside will be graduating from McGill University and received his training at Macdonald College. He was raised on a dairy farm, at Madoc, in Hastings County, and as an under-graduate has worked with the Extension Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture as Assistant Agricultural Representative in Frontenac County. In addition to his formal training he has had extensive practical training in 4-H Clubs and Junior Farmer programs; on two occasions has been a member of the 4-H Provincial Inter-Club competitions at Guelph; and is a former competitor in the Royal Winter Fair Judging Competition. At Macdonald College he has been active in student activities.

Mr. Burnside will be replacing D. E. Jackson, formerly the Assistant Agricultural Representative in Halton and Peel. Mr. Jackson has recently resigned from the Extension Branch, and is engaged in dairy farming at Bradford, in Simcoe County. Mr. Jackson joined the Extension Branch in May 1959, and has been attached to the Milton office from that time up until March of 1961.
