## County Council Approves Ontario 3% Sales Tax

### Two Members Say 'Not Our Business'

The Provincial Government's Sales Tax received a vote of confidence from Halton County Council last week. The usual action arose from a report by the County Council that municipalities be asked to support the tax. Reeve I. Ryckman, Chairman of the Legislation Committee, pressed the views of his committee saying, "We felt we could not pay the tax apart from rather than a 'line'," he declared. Warden Alex Phillips explained that the Legislature felt that the tax should be taken on a stand, rather than simply voting the resolution. Reeve Danz, Mayor of Georgetown and Deputy Reeve of the County of Acton, were also present. The vote was 12-4 in favour of the tax.

### Farmers' Numbers Down But 4-H Shows Increase

The 29th annual meeting of the Ontario Agricultural Women's Federation was held in Georgetown on April 24th. The meeting was held at the Georgetown Hotel and was attended by 411 members. The report of the Executive Committee was read and approved. The report stated that the number of members in the province had decreased by 4-H members had increased by 135 and girls' outnumbered boys in enrollment by 6,200. The meeting was held in the evening and was a success. The next meeting will be held in Toronto on May 1st.
