Halton M.P. Speaks in Commons on Agriculture

Halton Member of Parliament Alexander 'Sandy' Best spoke to the House recently on Agricultural Rehabilitation and Land Use, stating that the new resolution brought forward by the government may have an important bearing on such local services as Twelve and Sixteen Mile Creek, as well as the Credit and Grand River Authorities, through an extension of government contributions for watershed development. Here is the context of his speech, continued from last week:

Local Economy
The basic principle of the measure in the United States was the coordination and co-operation of self-help at many different levels with municipal, state government, the federal government, the church, industries and every facet of the local economy playing some part.

Sour Criticism
The United States program has come under some criticism because of the speed with which action has been taken. For instance, the Eisenhower administration believed that this measure should be carried out at a certain pace, but the National Planning Association of the United States... and I am now quoting from the Christian Science Monitor of December 16th, 1959... felt that much more massive federal aid would be necessary.

All Levels
However, it would seem that however this program works out both in the United States and in Canada it is essential, no matter what proportion of funds comes from what level of government, to have intense coordination and cooperation from all levels of government, and indeed of the community.

Most Important
I should like to mention certain specific recommendations before I sit down. It would seem, and of course, it is part of the resolution itself that a coordinating group or committee between various central...

In accepting the certificate, Mr. Wilson said: "In Halton we operate as one large fire department. When a call for aid arrives from one fire department, the others go with no question of time loss."

GEORGETOWN RESTRICTIONS SALE and DISCHARGE of FIREWORKS
Please Note That By-Law No. 58-14 Passed at the May 5th, 1958, Georgetown Council Meeting Establishes the Following Regulations Concerning Fireworks.
1. Fireworks can be sold in Georgetown only on the 7 days prior to and including the day fixed for Victoria Day celebration and none may be sold to anyone under the age of 18.
2. No fireworks can be discharged on any day except Victoria Day.
3. The fire chief may issue a permit for special displays by organizations under supervision of a properly qualified person. Written application should be made to the fire chief at least one week in advance of event.
4. A person convicted of breaking the by-law is liable to a fine up to \$50 plus costs.
Terms and conditions of above mentioned by-law will be strictly enforced by the Police Department.
