Simulate Nuclear Attack
Georgetown Re-Entry Point
Toronto was hit by a nuclear attack Friday and by Saturday re-entry operations had begun from army headquarters in Georgetown.
Working on that theory the 2nd Signals Regiment RC Signals of Toronto with supporting units of Provost Corps, and REME and RC Service Corps set up a wireless headquarters here on the weekend in an army scheme involving seventy five men and thirty army vehicles.
The convoy moved into the city from here over back roads under wireless control. C Company Armoury in Georgetown Park was the wireless headquarters.
The convoy rolled into town at about 10 o'clock Friday night to begin the operation, the first to be carried out by a signal unit.
Georgetown is considered the ideal headquarters for a re-entry operation following an A bomb attack on Toronto.

Bantam Soccer Team Probable for Town
Minor league soccer will be on the Georgetown sports agenda again this summer.
John Boyd of the Community Centre Association told the Herald this week that invitations have been received from both the Oakville Minor Soccer League and the Toronto Church League, but as yet, no action has been taken. In either case Georgetown would be required to enter a Bantam team.
The Toronto league's invitation, however, will probably be turned down since teams in the league are required to play the entire schedule on a Toronto field. A meeting will be called shortly to deal with the matter.
Georgetown's Atom soccer team which made such a line showing in its initial year in soccer competition will probably be idle.

Softball League in Process of Formation
The hibernating Industrial Softball League is beginning to stir.
President Jim Ford has called a meeting of the softballers for Sunday afternoon and the number of entries this season won't be known until then.
