Halton M.P. Speaks in Commons on Agriculture

Halton Member of Parliament, Alexander 'Sandy' Best spoke to the House recently on Agricultural Rehabilitation and Land Use, stating that the new resolution brought forward by the government may have an important bearing on such local services as Twelve and Sixteen Mile Creek, as well as the Credit and Grand River Authorities, through an extension of government contributions for watershed development.

It is interesting to examine what might be the result of the policy of the hon. member for Acton in advocating high support prices, more money and greater security for farmers in respect of specific commodities.

Two Results There are only two results which one can expect from his policy, in my opinion, and the hon. member does not seem to have spelled them off to farmers as he should. One is that we shall have disastrous over-production with the consequence that the government will step in to market the goods or to play some part which farmers do really not want. The second thing which may be implicit in high support prices is severe production controls.

Why does the leader of the CCF group in this house not mention this when he talks to Canadian farmers? Severe production control limiting each farmer to a certain specific unit of production would be necessary. This does not go with Canadian agriculture in general and I am sure Canadian farmers would not be happy with this sort of procedure.

Greater Degree Imperative Matter I have mentioned the hon. member for Essex East. I should like to comment briefly on the hon. member for Assiniboia who on January 25 made some arguments about this measure. He thought that getting farm products to market was the imperative matter and that support prices, priority prices and such like were much more important.

By-Law No. 60-11 Town of Georgetown

A By-Law to amend By-Law No. 57-91, being a restricted area zoning by-law, as amended by By-Law No. 59-37, as amended by By-Law No. 60-3.

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to amend By-Law No. 57-91 as amended by By-Law No. 59-37, as amended by By-Law No. 60-3;

NOW THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN BY ITS MUNICIPAL COUNCIL ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. THAT the following words are hereby deleted from Section 3.111: "Including signs within a building visible from the street"

2. THAT Section 4.6 (d) is hereby amended by adding thereto the following words: "and except for properly authorized and approved signs"

3. THAT Section 5.111 is hereby amended to read as follows: "No signs, other than those provided for by Section 5.11A, shall be permitted to be hereafter erected in any residential zone, except in the case of an apartment where not more than one bulletin board not exceeding twelve square feet in area shall be permitted provided that all such signs are located on the lot to which they relate."

BY-LAW read a first, second and third time and finally passed this 7th day of November 1960.
