Local Executive Members Attend Retarded Meeting

Fifteen members of the North Halton Association for Retarded Children attended the 8th annual conference of the Ontario Association for Retarded Children in Toronto, April 28-29.

Some 400 delegates from across the province participated in workshops and discussions. Theme of the conference was "In Partnership with the Community."

The North Halton Association is one of 70 local associations which operate 66 special schools; provide recreation and sheltered workshops; and give parents guidance and support in the broadening of horizons for 150,000 mentally retarded children and adults in Ontario.

Through the provincial organization, the North Halton Association helps finance research in the causes of mental retardation (more than 70 causes have been found to date). It works to better conditions for those who require institutional care, and to improve programs for training and teaching those who remain at home in the community.

The opening keynote address was delivered by Joel W. Aldred, President of CFTO-TV, Toronto, on Friday afternoon. CFTO-TV conducted a highly successful television for the O.A.R.C. early in January. The Hon. Matthew B. DeLeon, M.D.C.M., Minister of Health for Ontario, addressed the closing dinner.

Friday afternoon's program consisted of a demonstration, discussion and question-and-answer period conducted by the professional staff of the London Psychiatric Research Institute for Children under the chairmanship of Mrs. Eileen Kleinsteuber, chairman of the

Industrial Fire Group Sought by Mutual Aid

If industrial and commercial representatives will indicate a sufficient interest, a special industrial fire prevention committee will soon be organized by the Halton County Mutual Aid Fire Prevention Bureau. Meeting in Milton last week, members of the Bureau reviewed the important role of industrial and commercial establishments in Halton County, and decided that saving the high assessments warranted special fire prevention arrangements. "Our job not only involves saving the buildings from fire," said chairman Don Cherington of Trafalgar, "but we must also protect the jobs and paychecks of the employees."

The group agreed to forward letters to all industries inviting representatives to join the Bureau. If enough are interested, a new committee will be formed comprising the industrial-commercial delegates and firefighters from Halton's eight fire brigades.

The farm fire safety committee of the Bureau has been mapping a program on reducing farm fire losses, and arrangements are being made to publicize fire prevention through farm safety committees, 4-H club groups, Junior Farmers, Women's Institutes and agricultural fairs.

The committee has taken coloured slides of fire hazards seen on many of Halton's farms, and is planning to show the slides and demonstrate spot radio announcements and frequent publicity through area radio stations and newspapers are also being planned.

About 30,000 home fire hazard check sheets have been produced by the Bureau, and these were handed out to members for distribution throughout the county. Some municipalities have agreed to send out the check sheets with tax bills, thus saving distribution costs to the Bureau. Trafalgar Safety Council is planning to include fire prevention in its program this year. It was learned, and Chief Geo. Wright of Trafalgar was asked to discuss cooperation with this group. A fire hazard snapshot contest has been suggested for public school students, to be held in conjunction with local fairs. The Bureau is also studying a theatre day outing for Junior Fire Dept. members.
