Forty in Try-Outs For Spots on Team

Unseasonable weather is pushing commencement of construction on Georgetown's new baseball diamond closer and closer to opening day. The new diamond, which

will be located in the corner of the track infield nearest the main gate, will have to be ready by May 24th to be used on the local Intermedite A club's opening day. If the weather continues to force the delay the Intermediates may start the season on the diamond opposite the new bleachers. When the new diamond is in game condition, portable bleachers

will be placed along the first and third base lines.
