Mushrooming Enrolment Problem at Harrison

The enrolment swell at Harrison Public School is causing concern among Georgetown Public School Board trustees. Because of the growth of the school's registration which should have levelled off late last fall the school is rapidly reaching its saturation point and extra accommodation will definitely be required by September.

Capacity Five new pupils last week brought the total there to 580. The school's capacity is only slightly more than that.

At a meeting Monday night the board authorized the business administrator to call for tenders for the purchase of a portable classroom which would accommodate the projected 1961-62 enrolment. One portable is already included in the school's present teaching space. The Board is faced with the problem of predicting the time and place of any future home building which would make present space completely inadequate and necessitate a sixth public school.

The merits of opportunity classes are still being considered by the board. The classes, which would contain pupils not eligible for help through a retarded children's school but with a sub-normal learning capacity, found both favour and opposition, when debated informally.

Information The principals were instructed to seek further information regarding the number of local children who would require such classes, and the benefit they would receive from them.

Discuss Crossing Guard At Maple Ave-Highway

A school crossing guard at the Maple Ave. highway intersection was discussed at council meeting Monday.

Police chairman Wm. F. Hunter said the public school board considers this a council matter, but that guards at other crossings have been appointed by the board.

Mayor Hyde said there is doubt about the legality of guards stopping traffic unless they are town-appointed deputy police and he feels council should investigate and make sure of their position.

It was decided to seek information from the city of Toronto for the police committee to study.

Cr. Hunter said a complaint of speeding on Duncan Drive had been investigated, but despite use of radar on the street, no speeders had been uncovered.

Cr. Ian Cass said he has had complaints of speeding on George St. too.

Request to endorse an idea by North Bay council for a radical change in education costs was passed on to the high school board.
