Thompson Nickel Plant is Northern Vision Realized

Has Inco as 'Catalytic Agent'

Private enterprise in North America enjoyed one of its finest hours with the dedication of the International Nickel Company's Thompson works and townships in Northern Manitoba on Saturday, March 25th. There was northern vision not merely of the platitudinous type but vision astoundingly realized. Here was integrated production from mine to finished metal in a mighty industrial colossus reared in a remote wilderness in four short years.

Bush Tamed
Here too, the bush and musk had been tamed to permit civilization of the new frontier — the establishment of a town of tomorrow which is off to a striking start towards the goal predicted for it — the largest community in the province outside of metropolitan Winnipeg.

Financing International Nickel poured \$130 million into the \$185 million project which facilitated the construction of the Manitoba Hydro Electric Board's \$45 million Kelsey power plant 55 miles away with a loan of \$20 million at one per cent interest.

Take Over
Inco is also spending \$85 million to permit the Town of Thompson to eventually take over its own administration with no debt to be repaid for essential services.

From this amount also, the town of having every street and utility laid out in accordance with the most modern master planning and of ensuring an extremely low foot frontage for residential development has been made.

Who wonder? Premier Duff in his dedicatory remarks, hailed Inco as 'the great catalytic agent, the focal point for the further development and expansion of this sector.'

Large Measure
"To International Nickel," he said, "go our thanks for helping in large measure to open up one of the great wealth-producing areas of Canada. We pay tribute to a company of mining adventurers — men who, without a government charter or special privilege from the Crown, have paved the way for the permanent settlement of this frontier."

Canadian and U.S. Government representatives added their tributes. Luther H. Hodges, U.S. Secretary of Commerce, messaged: "Today industry stands on the threshold of a new frontier of expansion and growth. It is reasonable, therefore, to have near at hand a great new source of wealth which plays an important role in the civilian and industrial industries of our two nations. Livingston T. Merritt, U.S. Ambassador to Canada, declared: "This centre will be a boon to the industrial

growth both of Canada, the world's largest source of nickel, and of the United States, the world's largest consumer."
No Cutback
With Thompson entering production, no cutback in Sudbury operations is envisaged, and that means the same will hold true for the refinery at Port Colborne. Demand has at times forced Sudbury to exceed planned production, but normal capacity of 385,000,000 pounds a year is programmed.

Henry S. Wingate, Inco's chairman, sees the increased output of nickel flowing to new world markets the company is determined to create. "Nickel will be essential to the new fields being explored by science and modern technology — it has applications in the Space Age that is now upon us," he states.

New Markets
In seeking to expand ex-

isting markets, and to create new markets, we intend to succeed whatever the intensified competition from other materials," Mr. Wingate pledges.

The spirit that has inspired the great Thompson development has rubbed off on the people who have settled in the new community. The skilled personnel came largely from Sudbury, and Port Colborne has contributed a sizeable complement. It was natural that they had misgivings over moving into the Northern wilds.

Caught Up
Today they are caught up in the excitement of a great adventure. They're proud of their new community, its advantage and opportunities, and they have stamped it with a friendliness and character that warms and wins the most dubious heart.

Thompson is a proud and progressive Canadian development of the first magnitude.
