## Need Only 4 Home-Brews For Intermediate Hockey

A proposal made by the Raider hockey club was adopted at the 72nd annual meeting of the Ontario Hockey Association Saturday.

By the new amendment clubs in the league will have to dress only four homebrew players instead of five as in previous years. The move is expected to raise the calibre of intermediate hockey and in view of the wide span between the populations of a small town such as Milton and a city like Barrie, will contribute to a better balanced league.

Also altered at the meeting was the population limit for intermediate clubs. Instead of 10,000, the population ceiling for intermediate teams was jumped to 15,000, and towns over 5,000 must now compete in Intermediate B competition. The former limit for B was 4,000.

But for the change Georgetown Raiders would have probably had to go to Senior B.

Turned Down

A proposal by the Milton Merchants delegation at the meeting to permit teams to draw players from any town with a population up to that of the largest town in the league, was turned down.

The Raider hockey club was represented at the meeting by the secretary, Art McAllister.

## OUTDOORS SPORTSMEN

The Georgetown Anglers and Hunters Association since rejoining the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters some months ago are becoming more and more active in the Federation's many projects. One being the planting of trees in this area.

This project is being carried out mainly by its junior members, with supervision by the senior members of the club.

As a start, junior members Fred Howse Jr., Tom and John Copland, David Presswood, Keith Hill, Han Wiener, Bob Haley have begun replanting trees that were destroyed on the club's property last year by an ice storm.

It is hoped, by the club, that local farmers will grant the club permission to plant trees on their property, along roadsides, in swamp areas, or fields not used by the farmers for planting.

This planting, when done properly, will benefit both the farmers and wildlife in many ways.

The club has also been asked to carry out a fish survey on the Credit River from Terra Costa north to the Cataract.

This survey will be forwarded through the Federation to the Dept. of Lands and Forests and used in their studies of restocking the Credit.

It is for this reason that the club is asking for the cooperation of local fishermen, both young and old.

This fish census is to find out what fish are being caught in this part of the Credit River, their length and weight, whether retained or released, the number of people fishing in the party and the number of hours fished by the party and also the approximate depth of the water and the lure or method used when fishing.

This census is for all fish caught in the Credit, including suckers, and chub as well as trout.

The club members carrying out this survey are George Hoare, Fred Howse, Fred Spiers and myself and we would appreciate a phone call about any fishing you do this summer on the Credit River.

We will also be carrying out this survey along the river itself all through the summer and hope you won't think we're being nosy if we stop and ask you a few questions.

Through Mr. R. R. Swan of Molson's Brewery, I have received 200 entry forms for their annual fish contest and will gladly send you some upon request.

There's a lot of money to be won in contests such as this that could pay for a lot of weekend trips, but you'll never win any contest, unless you enter it.

Mr. J. Rawlings of 61 Delrex phoned me last week to report his 15 1/2 inch Brown trout caught at the paper mill dam last Saturday using a gold colour spoon and a worm. The fish weighed 1 lb. 3 1/2 ozs. which seems a little light for a 15 1/2 Brown.

Mr. Rawlings also mentioned that the trout had a circular shaped mark on its side that could indicate a lamprey eel has been feeding on this trout at some time. This was reported to Clare Wilson, but at this time, no report has reached yours truly as to the Department's findings, but it is hoped that this mark turns out to be only a bruise from some obstacle in the river.

Yours truly received a few calls from readers asking if I knew of anyplace locally where worms could be bought. I was sorry to say I didn't. But if anyone around town is selling worms I would appreciate a call at TR. 7-4957. And in this way I would have your name and address on hand to tell any readers that might phone in the future.

Fickerel season opens this Friday at 12:01 and yours truly hopes that his annual Fickerel trip meets with more success than the trout trip to the Pine River on opening day.

This time I will be visiting my old stamping grounds, the south shore of Lake Nipissing.

## Bowling is Newest Activity for Teenagers

### Saturday Mornings At Lucky Strike

An all-star mixed teen bowling team, competitive bowling, and "good clean fun", are the aims of Georgetown's newest sports group, the Teen Bowling League which officially became part of the local sports scene last week.

Fostered by Harry Haylock, the new league has met with rewarding response bearing out Mr. Haylock's initial belief that there is a definite need for this activity among the teen population.

"We have no side purpose, such as proving to Pierre Burton what a good group of teenagers we have in our town," said Mr. Haylock. "The parents already know the answer to that one."

**Big Boost**

The league is getting a big boost from co-proprietor Harry Chappel, of the Lucky Strike Club, who is helping in every way possible. He has donated lucky draw prizes, operated the coloured head-pin-for-prizes system, provided the necessary forms for the league secretary and has offered two features for the final day of the schedule, a transistor radio as a hidden score prize, and a wicker rosette right in the bowling alleys.

There is free bowling for each week's most improved bowler, and trophies and last day prizes will be available to bowlers adhering to the minimum attendance rule.

The management has agreed to open the alleys on Saturday mornings during the off-season and will do so for as long as the league receives support. Anyone 14 to 17 years of age is eligible to join.

### Midget Baseball Opens on May 28th

Georgetown's other entry in the Halton County Baseball League this year, the Midgets, will start their home season May 28th.

The club, which will be an all star team picked from a local midget ball league, will face Campbellville, Burlington, Milton and Dundas in the twelve game schedule which will begin August 1st.

Each team will face one of the other clubs four games, departing from the normal two game home and home set. Georgetown drew Burlington for the extra games, while Bronte got Dundas and Milton drew Campbellville. No matter which club wins the playoffs for the league title, the team that finishes on top at the end of the regular schedule will be the one that advances to the Ontario Ball Association playoffs.

Some hard and fast rules have been set for the Midgets. Arguing with an umpire will mean an automatic three game suspension, and any player smoking in the playing area will get the same sentence. A player absent from three games or three practices or any combination of the two, without a concrete reason will be off the team.

Players in the town league who don't make the all star team at the beginning can still catch a spot through the season if their play improves enough. Nine players must be signed by opening day but even their spot won't be secure. Says manager Bill Richmond: "If a player lets up part way through the season there will be one from the town league ready to step into his place."
