WHAT COUNCIL DID

Islands, Not Boulevard Is Plan for Main Street

"I hope the Herald editor is going to take some of the critics off our backs," said Mayor Hyde Monday when he pointed out that Main Street reconstruction will not create a boulevard as a newspaper article said last week.

"Wee islands," if you want to call them that, will anchor hydro light standards in the centre of the road, but there will be no centre curbing other than protection for the standards, the mayor said.

Between poles, pavement will be painted white and will be available for truck stops for unloading.

Service Roads
"But eventually we hope for service roads behind all Main St. buildings to eliminate completely the problem of trucks stopping for deliveries," says Mayor Hyde.

A scale model of the street as it will look is in the town engineering office. Reserved parking is planned at the bus stops.

Centre Poles
Plans, presently in their finalizing stage, call for eleven centre poles in the two Main St. blocks. But possibility of having four light brackets on each pole, and reducing the number to eight is being studied with hydro officials.

Interruptions
Meanwhile, there will be some interruptions on the street. This week traffic has been detoured at times around the north block from Wesleyan St. while water pipes are being replaced at various locations.

Claims Dog Nuisance Wants Action in Glen

Councillor Wilfred Leslie agreed. However, Coun. Wilfrid Bird demurred. He pointed out there are many people with only five acres who are a long way from anyone who would have to keep their dogs tied up. "The area to be controlled would have to be defined," said the councillor.

"Suppose we do get a by-law," stated George Leslie, "how are we going to enforce it?"

"There's a dog catcher in the Glen, who'd be happy to do it," replied Mr. Garvin.

"We'll talk with the dog catcher and see if we can make a deal," the councillor promised.

"We'll also define the boundaries of Glen Williams," he concluded.

Aim for Championship Baseball Coach Says FIRST GAME THIS SATURDAY IN ACTON

The team tastes its first real competition this Saturday afternoon in Acton park when they pit their untired process against a "new look" Acton ball club.

The farmertown team was left with gaping holes in the lineup when their Georgetown commuters left to catch a berth here. So the opener will be more of a toss-up than ever.

The locals have been working out at the park since early April but weather has been against them, making the job of getting into shape not the easiest of matters. Hurlers Ready
Though Chie Jewell hasn't named his starting lineup, or even made any claims, his pitching staff is as set now as it will ever be. Lynn McLaren is the playing coach, and Bernie Bore, are starting right handers. Dave Hart, and possibly Al Duncan and Jim Beckett, will provide southpaw pitching. Another possibility is Jim McGill who has shown up well in practice.

The club's muscle power at the plate and clutch fielding won't really be known until the Saturday test. The first home game is scheduled for Wednesday, May 24th.

Strong criticism of the newly formed county Industrial Committee was made by a number of Georgetown councillors on Monday.

"Industrial promotion has reached a saturation point," opined Cr. Ian Cass who with Cr. Wm. F. Hunter moved a formal protest to all county municipalities against the new committee being supported by county funds. He termed the committee a duplication of effort using municipal funds for something which should be a purely local function.

New Committee
"We're all chasing a few industries," he continued. "The new committee is set up on an exploratory basis. It's simple to create but hard to destroy, and it's weighted in favour of the southern municipalities."

Cr. Hunter, who was appointed last week as Georgetown's delegate to the committee, blasted a set-up which includes the Trafalgar industrial commissioner as chairman.

"Cr. George Leslie of Esqueusing and myself are the only councillors. The rest are paid commissioners or municipal clerks," he pointed out.

Two Days
Cr. Hunter said he had wanted night meetings, but the majority of the committee decided on two days weekly.

"All I get is \$2.60 mileage and for that I can't afford to give up two days a month if any of you want the job you're welcome to it," he said.

Opposite View
Reeve Doug Sargent expressed an opposite view.

"I supported this in county council and I'm certainly for a cooperative venture," he said.
