We were able to release these pickerel quite easily as when casting with artificial lures most fish are caught in the front of the mouth and can be released with no danger to the fish if a little care is taken.

On Sunday, using artificial lures again, we landed 14 pickerel averaging 3 lbs. each, before dinner.

This year's trip gave me a fish story to tell my friends for weeks to come. As I had on for a few minutes what I am sure would have been the biggest fish that I have caught in my life.

His size was only half the thrill as he was caught on a would-be trout fly that I had tied on a pickerel hook when practicing trout fly tying.

To be honest, I think he struck at the fly, through sheer fright alone, but I won't tell my friends this.

Many thanks to the readers that phoned me about the fish that they've caught in the Credit River and to the ones who phoned to let me know where dew worms can be bought.

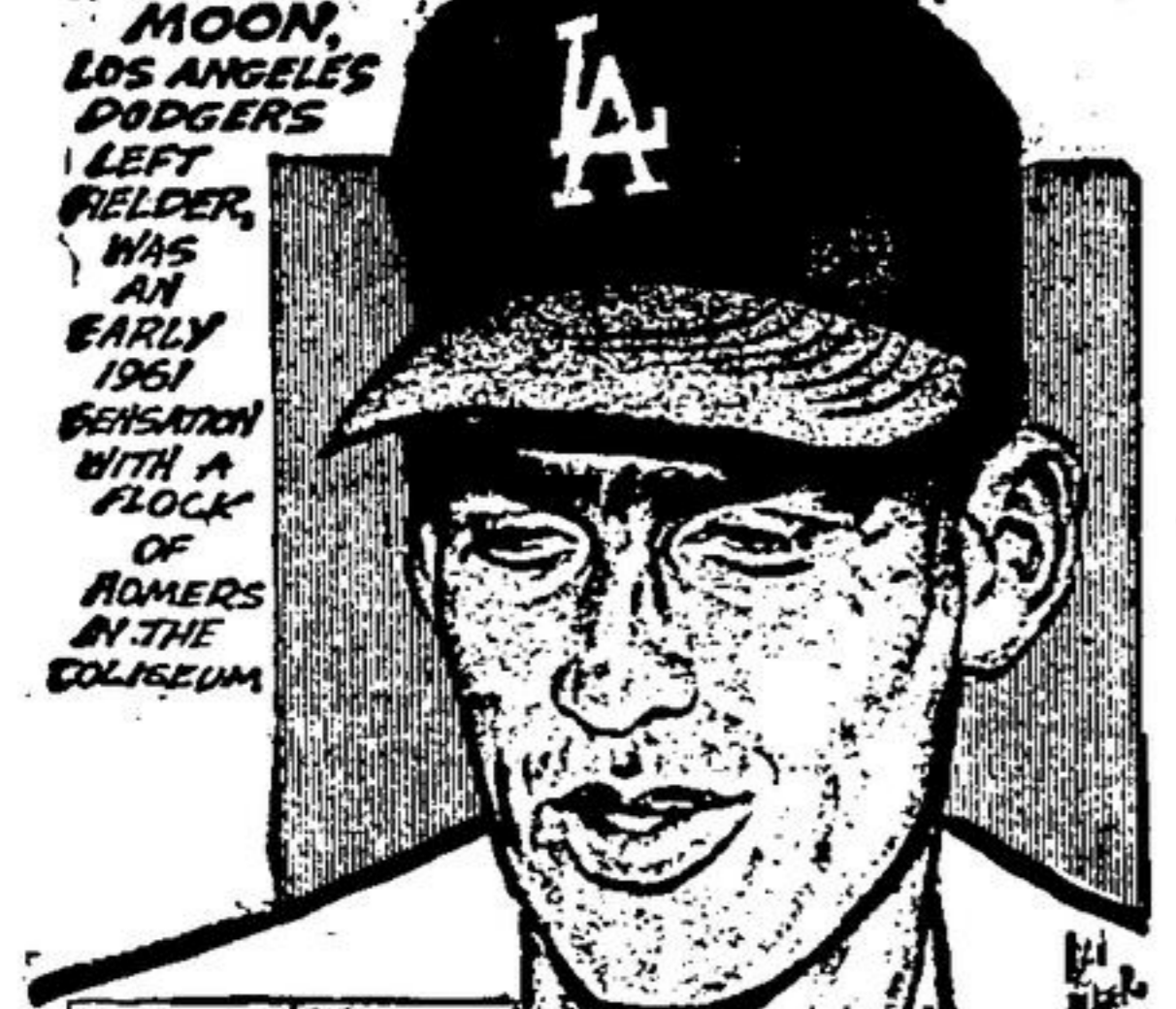

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GEORGETOWN RESTRICTIONS

SALE and DISCHARGE of FIREWORKS

Please Note That By-Law No. 58-14 Passed at the May 5th, 1958, Georgetown Council Meeting Establishes the Following Regulations Concerning Fireworks.

1. Fireworks can be sold in Georgetown only on the 7 days prior to and including the day fixed for Victoria Day celebration and none may be sold to anyone under the age of 16.
2. No fireworks can be discharged on any day except Victoria Day.
3. The fire chief may issue a permit for special displays by organizations under supervision of a properly qualified person. Written application should be made to the fire chief at least one week in advance of event.
4. A person convicted of breaking the by-law is liable to a fine up to \$50 plus costs.

Terms and conditions of above mentioned by-law will be strictly enforced by the Police Department.
