WHAT COUNCIL DID

Residents Share Cost Windsor Road Sidewalks

Sidewalks will be installed on the east side of Windsor Road, with residents paying for concrete and the town supplying labour, it was decided Monday by council.

All residents have agreed to the proposal which will be undertaken under the Winter Works program. Cost is estimated at \$2.00 per foot for the 600 ft. of walk to be paid.

The plan is a new one this year and is one which may be followed in future where 100% co-operation can be gained from residents. "Otherwise, sidewalks are laid under Local Improvements and paid for over a period of years."

Assessment Commissioner Joseph Gibbons explained a motion which he had seconded at the assessors' convention in Hamilton seeking authority for assessors to find amount of payment when local sales are transferred through the Provincial Treasurer.

At present the price will not be revealed by Queen's Park, he said, and this hampers an assessor.

As an example he cited the case of Thomson Newspapers which, when purchasing the Georgetown Herald in 1959 registered the purchase in this way.

"It's disturbing to find that a large organization can deprive the assessor of this information which an ordinary vendor has to disclose," he said, asking council to endorse the idea.

Mayor Hyde said that if Mr. Gibbons would draft a resolution and present it to council it would have consideration.

The assessment commissioner was detailed to attend a 2-day school for assessors in Hamilton on June 20-21.

Cr. Ian Cass reported on the recent municipal tree planting and said he was pleased with co-operation of residents of Sargent Rd., most of whom had contributed to the cost of trees.

He commended the town works staff on their work and said that he anticipates no trouble with "limited growth" maples planted along Maple Ave. Twenty-year-old maples may have to be topped if they interfere with hydro wires, but maximum tree growth is only 25 feet, he said.

Cr. Jim Emmerson said that the Legion Imperials want to plant trees in the new Remembrance Park and Cr. Cass said his committee will be planning this too.
