Comprehensive Questions For Census of Farmers

The census being conducted in Ontario is being conducted in much more than the usual hill of beans or row of potatoes. All told, farmers will be quizzed with anywhere from 10 to 15 census forms. Two series of questions are being asked of city and country folk alike. The first, on agriculture, will collect information on every resident of Ontario while the second, on housing, will gather facts from one household in five in both urban and rural areas. So that people will know in advance the questions the census taker will ask, population and housing questions are listed in a green leaflet being mailed to all households in the last week of May. In addition, farmers will answer the main agricultural questionnaire. Its queries — on crops, livestock, part-time work, machinery and capital — are also being mailed in advance. Further, farmers in British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan and Ontario with an irrigation system will be asked questions about it. And those who have sold, cut or used wood products in the past 12 months — along with those who have had a woodland fire in the past five years — will be asked questions on woodlands.

Need No Referendum For Fluoridation

The report of a Special Committee on Fluoridation of Municipal Water Supplies appointed by the Ontario Government in 1959 was submitted to the Ontario Government a few weeks ago.

Many Months
After hearing evidence from many sources over a period of many long months the Commission endorsed fluoridation, without qualification, repeated all arguments as to its problematic dangers and recommended that legislation be passed permitting municipalities to commence fluoridation by virtue of municipal by-law without the necessity of a referendum. The Government of Ontario and the Commission alike are to be congratulated on a very fine report.

Endorsed
It is to be expected that this most exhaustive of reports will have repercussions, not only in Ontario but indeed in all of North America and throughout the world. Fluoridation has already been endorsed by the World Health Organization and by many scientific bodies throughout the world.

Politics
The position of the governments which hesitate to put into effect the conclusions of scientific bodies is easily understood. Governments in democratic countries retain office because they are elected. However sound may be any proposition, if the electorate is uneducated as to the virtues of any proposal thrown into the arena of politics, they are likely to suffer at the next election.

Intervention
However there are some measures which are and should be decided without in the intervention of the voters. For example salt for human consumption is now iodized by law to prevent goitre. This is true because of a decision made by the Dominion Government as the result of sound advice from valid medical sources. Similarly Vitamin "D" was added to Canadian bread without asking the electors to make a decision on a subject about which the average voter knew very little.

Ridiculous
A referendum on a subject such as fluoridation is just about as ridiculous as asking for a referendum as to whether a dangerous tiger should be disposed of when it is already killing women and children, Caries or tooth decay is a menace to the health and life of people — children and adults alike. It is to be hoped that municipalities, generally, will pass the necessary by-laws to institute fluoridation of water supplies at once. To waste public money on futile plebiscites is senseless.

Know Little
However one cannot deny that there are thousands of people who know very little about the dangers of caries or the value of fluoridation. For these a continuous campaign of education is obviously desirable. "Where ignorance is bliss 'tis folly to be wise" and it was ever thus. The value of spending money on health education is hardly realized yet by either governments or people generally. It is so much easier to spend more and more money on hospitals for people who should not be ill and too much in charities to help people who should not be poor.
