Four Liberal Candidates Speak at Local Meeting

The four aspirants for the Liberal federal nomination carried their fight into Georgetown last week. At a well attended meeting in the Delrex building all four agreed that unemployment would be the major issue in the next federal election. The issue of unemployment was raised by one of the local Liberals, Claude Kewley, who maintained that 90 per cent of the homes in the Delrex subdivision have changed hands since the cancellation of the Arrow contract by the present Conservative government.

Low Cost Housing
During his discussion on unemployment, Harry Pollard, economist, presented a copy of his brief to the Senate Committee on Unemployment.

Mr. Michael Mutzak, Oakville businessman, suggested that he would fight for legislation against high bonus mortgages and would promote low cost housing.

Cy Young, local news editor for the radio station CHWO pointed out that while unemployment affected all from a business point of view, unemployment had not yet affected the majority of people in the southern part of the riding.

Dr. Harry Harley, M.D., condemned the present Government for its indecision on Defence Policy. He claimed that the cancellation of the Arrow contract was the chief contributor to unemployment in the riding. He pointed out that the present government was considering purchase of manned aircraft from the U.S. which is inferior to the Arrow, seven of which were put to the torch rather than be used at least for experimental purposes. He went on to say that both the U.S. and Britain had made offers for the operational Arrows for such a purpose.

Georgetown Man

The four candidates will continue the fight for the Nomination at Oakville on Tuesday, May 30th at the Royal Oak Hotel. It was indicated last night that a Georgetown businessman would enter the contest at that meeting. Party officials are jubilant with the success of the wide open battle for the Nomination. The dates for further meetings in Burlington and Acton were also disclosed.

The date for the Burlington meeting is June 6th and Acton is June 9th. The nominating convention will be held in Milton on Tuesday, June 20th. Local officials expect either Lester Pearson or Paul Martin to be the guest speaker.

On Saturday, May 20th, Ida May Cantelon, wife of Fred Wrigglesworth died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. James Carney, "Carnaces", R. R. 3, Georgetown.

She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Cantelon and was born near Streetsville on March 8th, 1878. She married Fred Wrigglesworth in 1905. They made their home in the Hornby district until 1932 when they moved to the Ashgrove community where they had since resided.

She was a member of Ashgrove United Church and a life member of the Women's Missionary Society. Mrs. Wrigglesworth always took a keen interest in church and community activities and the young people of the district were always sure of a welcome at her home.

The funeral service was held on Monday afternoon in Ashgrove United Church.

Rev. E. Madden of Eden United Church conducted the service in the absence of her own minister Rev. J. Hill of Hornby. Burial was in Ashgrove Cemetery. New Quarry Locates In Esqueing Township

Associated Quarries Ltd., a subsidiary of the St. Lawrence Cement Co., this week began stripping and development of a new quarry north of Highway 401, on the First Line of Esqueing.

Geologist Frank Beale emphasized the quarry development will have regard for the face of the escarpment and while a narrow cut may be necessary for a conveyor, the balance of the quarry will not be visible and the face of the escarpment will not be destroyed.

Presently the firm has 1,000 acres under option for the quarry with about 500 acres acquired. Reason for the large acreage is to assure the quarry will not disturb neighbors. Mr. Beale noted.

Some machinery is on the site now and it is expected the first material will be delivered within a month. The crushed stone aggregate will be used in ready mix cement and for similar uses. It will not be used by the St. Lawrence Co. in the manufacture of powdered cement. Mr. Beale explained.

Associated Quarries also operates quarries at Kirfield and Hagersville.
