### Georgetown Fourth on List County Council Sets Levy

The equalization by-law setting out the County levy for each municipality in the County was passed last week at County Council. Burlington tops the list with a levy of \$507.134. Trafalgar is second with \$402,559. Oakville is third with \$146,206 and Georgetown is fourth with \$84,836. The next four, in order are Milton with \$43,390, Esquesing with \$39,573, Acton with \$34,518 and Nassagaweya with \$14,283.

The five municipalities who comprised the now extinct Halton High School District Board must pay additional amounts on high school debentures. This includes the much debated extra payment on the Milton High School debentures. The percentage of responsibility on the high school debentures is divided in ratio to assessment with Georgetown carrying 39.17 per cent., Milton 20.03 per cent., Esquesing 18.27 per cent., Acton 15.94 per cent and Nassagaweya 6.59 per cent.

### Auxiliary To Sponsor Child At Summer Camp

At the Georgetown Auxiliary for retarded children meeting held on May 16, the constitution and its bylaws were presented by Mrs. A. E. Macintosh. A vote of thanks was given to Mrs. R. D. Costley, Mrs. G. C. Hewson and Mrs. A. E. Macintosh, who are on the Board of Directors, by Mrs. W. Treacy, President of the Auxiliary.

Business activities included final arrangements for the forthcoming Lake Sale Readers of this article may be interested to learn that proceeds from this sale will be used to sponsor a child from the North Halton area to summer camp at Lake Belwood, Guelph. The cost of sponsoring a child is \$75. Part of this high figure is accounted for by the fact that at a camp for retarded children there are two children to one counsellor or instructor for the younger children and three children to one counsellor for the older children.

Members were shown a beautiful oil painting donated to the Auxiliary for a raffle. This painting was done by Mrs. G. Breckenridge, a visitor to Canada and mother of Mrs. G. Milward, vice president of the Auxiliary.

The auxiliary discussed the prospect of adopting a retarded child in an institution if possible it was decided to adopt a child in the care of a Children's Aid Society in the North Halton area. Mrs. E. Ball informed the group that it costs \$25 annual fee. This amount provides for a ward party on the child's birthday, Christmas and other celebrations during the year.

The main topic of conversation during the general discussion period was opportunity classes. It was learned that there is a great need for these classes in our own community as there are approximately forty five children in Georgetown requiring special training. Information on hand determined

that it takes twelve months to set up an Opportunity Class. During this time tests are made to assess which children require special training. Final tests are usually conducted with the assistance of an accredited psychologist. Also there are cases where a child has been in an opportunity class in Toronto prior to moving to Georgetown and is now unable to do so thereby creating a feeling of frustration for the child. At the 8th annual conference of the Ontario Association for Retarded Children, the staff of the Psychiatric Research Institute for Children at London, could not have been more emphatic when they stated that every community should have its opportunity class or classes. Dr. D. E. Zarfus, superintendent of the Institute advised that technical advice would be freely given to all interested parties on the establishment of such classes. The interest of the Auxiliary in this matter was stimulated by the recent building fund campaign when canvassers were approached by parents.

The evening's surprise gift raffle was donated by Mrs. T. Tomazic and two afternoon tea aprons were won by Mrs. E. Ball.

**STREETSVILLE**  
Deploring Toronto Twp. Reeve Robert Speck's methods, Streetsville council, last week, unanimously decided to maintain a unified front in fighting annexation.

**ORANGEVILLE**  
Orangeville's police chief Ernie West announced last week that his department had recovered \$27,000 worth of securities missing since last October from the law offices of Wardlaw and Wardlaw, Orangeville.

**OAKVILLE**  
Construction of a technical school instead of a composite school about to be built in Oakville was urged by representatives of Oakville - Trafalgar councils at a special meeting with the District High School Board. Government would pay 50 per cent of the \$1,473,048 school proposed.
