Remembrance Service At 7th Line Cemetery

A Service of Remembrance is planned for June 4th, 1961 at 3 p.m. at the reclaimed cemetery on the 7th Line, situated between Stewarttown and Ashgrove. This cemetery is a portion of the land, given in 1833 — "to be occupied as a grave yard, and for the situation of a school house, or Methodist Meeting House" — by Mr. George Thompson to: Wm. Thompson, Wm. Reed, John Reid, Wm. Morrison, Christopher Gouke, George Murray, John Harrison — as trustees forever, or their successors. West Side A Methodist Church — called Mt. Pleasant Wesleyan Methodist — was built there in 1841. However in 1880, it was moved to the south side of No. 15 side road, to the east, and served there till 1890, when it was closed. Later the Stewarttown Church of England bought it and moved it to its present location on the west side of the 7th Line. A beautiful window was placed there by them, in memory of the late Mr. George Thompson.

Parade Route in Doubt With Main St. Revamp

Possibility of putting four lighting units on the centre-street standards being planned for Georgetown's "New Look" was vetoed by a firm of lighting engineers when they advised council last week that it would be impractical. Four units would give no better lighting than two, the firm feels, however, they said that it would be possible to reduce the light standards by one in each block without hurting visibility. Meanwhile the town engineering department will co-operate as far as possible with two major events planned for town — the June 10th rodeo parade sponsored by the Lions Club and the July 8th tri-county Orange parade. Both parades would normally use Main Street as their focal point and every effort will be made to have the street in shape. Failing this, an alternate route will be provided to the park.

Merchant Here Now Pawn Shop Operator

Shades of Pittsburgh, Penn., there's a pawn shop in the vicinity. With the passing of a pawn shop by law at Brampton council meeting recently, Gerry Panzer, who formerly operated Kenton Cut-Rate here and David Peters of Brampton, have announced they will open a pawn shop as soon as a license can be obtained.

Application

It was the application for a pawnbrokers' license a few weeks ago by Mr. Peters that prompted the passing of the by-law. The pawn shop will be located at 84 Main St. N., Brampton in the present Variety Shop. The by-law contains rigid regulations in the operation of a pawn shop and provides for close supervision by the police department. The pawnbroker must keep a record of the transactions in a book. A list of the pawned items, plus the name, address and description of the pawn must be reported to the Chief of Police daily.

Under the by-law the pawnbroker posts a \$1,000 bond for security on the issuance of the 500 pawnbrokers' license which will be renewed annually. Penalties for infractions of the by-law is a \$40 fine and council reserves the right to refuse renewal of the license at any time without giving a reason.
