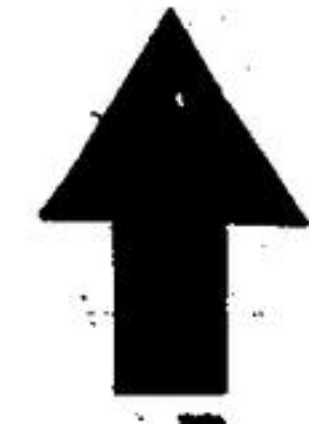

WHAT COUNCIL DID
Rush Sidewalks For Winter Works Aid

With somewhat altered plans, a Winter Works sidewalk project on part of Windsor Road was rushed to completion this week in time to take advantage of government assistance.

Materials
Originally council planned to install a sidewalk, believing area residents were in 100% agreement, but last week Louis Bodin protested by letter that he did not favour the plan, under which residents would pay for materials and the town do the installing.

Monday other residents, with Charles Bailey as spokesman asked council to consider sidewalk on four lots on Shelley St. and a corner lot on Shelley St. which would connect with a sidewalk running down Shelley from Windsor Road. Total cost for the 360 ft. of sidewalk was estimated at \$720.

Today
Council endorsed the idea and work began the next day so the project could be completed by the June 1st deadline.
