## Here's What the Census Takers Want to Know

**To Be Asked of Every Person in Canada**  
 Name, sex, age, relationship to head of household? Are you single, married, widowed, or divorced? In what province (or country) were you born? In what year did you immigrate to Canada? (If not born in Canada).  
 Country of citizenship. Are you a Canadian? (If not, of what country are you a national or a citizen?)  
 To what ethnic or cultural group did you or your ancestor (on the male side) belong on coming to this continent? What is your religion?  
 What language did you first learn in childhood and still understand?  
 Can you speak English, French?  
 What was the highest grade or year of schooling you ever attended?  
 Since last September did you attend school or university?

**To be asked only of persons 15 years of age and over, as applicable**  
 Did you have a job of any kind last week (even if not at work or part-time)?  
 Did you look for work last week?  
 Did you have a job at any time in the past 12 months?  
 Number of hours usually worked each week?  
 For whom did you work last week (or when you last worked)?  
 What kind of business or industry was this?  
 What kind of work did you do in this industry?  
 Did you operate your own business or work for others in this occupation?  
 In how many weeks did you work for wages or salary in the past 12 months?  
 What was your gross wage and salary income (before deductions) in this period?

**To be asked only of males 25 years of age and over**  
 Did you ever have any wartime service in the active military forces of Canada or allied countries?  
**To be asked at every fifth household of persons 15 years and over**  
 Did you live in this dwelling five years ago on June 1, 1956? If not, in what city, town, village or municipality did you live? Was this dwelling on a farm or small agricultural holding?  
 Answers to the following questions, concerning income to be asked in non-farm households only, will be filled in personally by the individual concerned and the completed questionnaire sealed before it is handed to the census taker who will call back for it:  
 What were your gross earnings in wages, salaries, commissions, or tips, from all wage and salaried jobs in the past 12 months?  
 What were your earnings from your own business or professional practice in the past 12 months?  
 Whether or not you worked in the past 12 months, what was your income from: family allowances; old age pensions; other income from Federal, Provincial, and Municipal Governments; retirement pensions; bond and bank interest; and dividends; income from other investments; and other sources?

**To be asked at every fifth household of married, widowed and divorced women**  
 What was the date of your (first) marriage?  
 How many live-born children have you had?  
**HOUSING QUESTIONS**  
**To be asked at every Fifth Household**  
 What type is this dwelling? (e.g., single detached, apartment, flat, etc.)  
 When was this building built?  
 Is this building used only for residential purposes?  
 How long have you lived in this dwelling?  
 Did you own or rent your previous dwelling?  
 How many rooms in your present dwellings (exclude bathrooms)?  
 How many bedrooms?  
 What is the water supply, and if piped what is the source?  
 What are the bath, toilet facilities?  
 Are the toilet facilities shared with another household?  
 What is the method of sewage disposal?  
 What is the principal heating equipment, heating fuel?  
 What type of refrigeration do you have (excluding home freezers)?  
 Has this household a home freezer, television, passenger automobile?  
 Is this dwelling owned or rented?

**To be asked only of owner-occupiers**  
 If you were selling this dwelling now what would you expect to get for it? (answers in \$4,000 ranges.)  
 Is there a mortgage on this dwelling?  
 Is the holder of the first mortgage, a government agency, (Dominion, Provincial or Municipal), bank or insurance, loan, trust, or mortgage company, a private individual, other (Credit Union, etc.)  
**To be asked only of Tenant-Occupiers**  
 What was your cash rent for May, 1961?  
 Did it include refrigerator, cooking stove, furniture, garage?  
 Do you pay for any of the following services over and above cash rent — water, electricity, gas, coal, kerosene, oil, or wood? If so, what is your average monthly payment for the first three items, and your average yearly payment for the last?

## OUTDOORS SPORTSMEN

Vehicle entry permits were placed on sale in Provincial Parks in the Lake Simcoe district on Friday, May 12th and Superintendent report that sales are almost double those of last year for the same opening weekend.  
 It was estimated that nearly 10,000 visitors visited these parks. So if this first weekend is any criterion we may well expect another record season.

It is for this reason that the outdoors sportsman, picnicker, Sunday driver, etc., should begin to prepare and practise the prevention of forest fires.  
 Forest fires or fires of any kind can be classed as one of the most expensive, life taking, and disastrous weapons of destruction that can be created by a single person with just one act of carelessness.  
 For the past 12 years an average of 1,450,000 acres are destroyed annually by fire.  
 The cost of fighting these fires was \$2,115,000 and the outlay for fire protection totalled \$20,000,000 in 1957 alone.  
 It was the last year that complete statistics were made on 6,000 fires.  
 But again such statistics don't tell the full story. People who love the woods and want to return again and again must be made aware that forest fires bring other disasters in their wake that can not be valued in money.  
 Unemployment in forest industries.  
 Devastation of recreation areas.  
 Destruction of animal and fish life.  
 Erosion and floods by the altering of watersheds.  
 And in most cases the loss of homes and human life.

The most costly fire in recent years occurred in 1948 in Mississauga. Two fires broke out simultaneously, one at Chappleau, Ontario, the other at Saul Ste. Marie. When the fires joined 600,000 acres of prime red and white pine were ravaged. How did the fires start? In both cases men who should have known better were believed responsible. The Chappleau fire was blamed on a construction worker who ducked into the woods for a smoke. The Saul Ste. Marie fire was traced to a trapper who neglected his campfire.  
 So we can't blame all the forest fires on outdoor beginners. We can all make mistakes.  
 The Georgetown Anglers and Hunters Ass'n. held their first Monster Shoot on the Club grounds last Saturday. Some 50 shooters attended and some 15 shooters were rewarded with turkeys, chickens or hams.  
 I must tell you I won a 4 or 5 lb. chicken with the first shot fired at the shoot on the 22 rifle range by scoring a bullseye for ten points, but then I think they slipped me a blank cartridge as I missed the target completely on the next try.  
 Oh, well, I wasn't really trying, anyhow.  
 I would again like to request that if any of my readers happen to fish the Credit river between Terra Cotta and the Cataract, I would appreciate a call at TR. 7-4957. This is with reference to any type of fish caught big or small, kept or released as this survey being conducted by the GA&HA is very important to conservation.

## Lose Opener, But Ball Team Shapes Up Well

### Bronte Here June 7 For Next Home Game

The team that has been termed a first piece probable for this season, Milton Red Sox, looked catchable in their debut here Wednesday when they took a shaky 5-2 victory from the locals after dropping behind early in the ball game.  
 Though three runs better on the score sheet the Sox collected only five hits off two Georgetown pitchers and left only four men stranded on the bases. The locals were just one less in the hitting department and left six men on base in their first complete game. Actually the seven inning contest was called at the end of six, because of darkness.

A crowd of unexpected proportions greeted baseball's return to Georgetown and watched their club give up a run in the first and then bounce back with a pair in the bottom half of the inning for their only lead. Milton went to the front in their two hit stint in the 3rd started by Stu Hannant's bad hop-home run to right field. After that Rigo walked and scored on Cully's shot through the middle. Garret walked for Saulnier in the 5th scored the final run.  
 The left fielder Ron Breen, and second sacker Paul Legge, the only Georgetown runners who made the round trip got on via a walk and a line single respectively, and were brought around on Blake Inglis base hit. Butch Riddell went all the way on the Milton mound. Lynn McLaren who started for Georgetown, gave way to Glen Gibbs in the 6th and together accounted for 7 Milton strike outs on Riddell's 3.  
 Rigo and Shannon of the Sox and Timleck for Georgetown, all rapped doubles, but Timleck was thrown out trying to stretch it to a triple. Each club committed only one error.  
 Before the game got under way the teams and fans observed a minute's silence for Chick Jewell who died while guiding the Georgetown crew in their first game of the season in Acton, Saturday, May 20th.  
 The game scheduled for Saturday in Bronte was called off because of bad ground conditions. Campbellville was slated to make their first local appearance last night too late for coverage, and Bronte comes in for their first stand Wednesday June 7th.
