Initial Approval Given For Technical School

Government Okays All But \$8,000 Cafeteria

Georgetown High School Board's application for special federal-provincial grants who would build a seventeen room technical wing here cost-free has received 95 per cent approval.

Cafeteria
In a letter to board secretary Foregrave, the Deputy Minister of Education for Ontario, C. W. Booth, said that all of the rooms and equipment listed by the Georgetown board had been deemed eligible for the special grant, except half of the proposed cafeteria.

In cost, half of the proposed cafeteria amounts to approximately \$35,000, the major part of which would be paid by the normal Department of Education grant. To the town it would mean about an \$8,000 expenditure.

Approval
Because of the approaching summer recess of the Municipal Board who would have to approve the debenture issue, trustees favoured approaching council immediately for approval so that the Municipal Board could act on it before their holidays. Otherwise action would be held up until the fall.

Presently 581 are enrolled at the high school which offers special accommodation for 680. A survey has revealed that it will be 1055 within the next

five years. The proposed technical wing would place the saturation point at 1050.

Accease
Earlier information given the board was slightly altered by one part of the letter which stated that the school's present acreage was the minimum considered adequate to accommodate an enrolment of 1050 pupils.

The architectural firm of Barnett and Rieder was officially engaged by the board and instructed to proceed immediately with sketch plans of the new rooms.

Advisory Board Will Aid Vocational School

A new school advisory committee will be created here when the Georgetown High School Board receives a reply to their request to the Dept. of Education for permission to form an Advisory Vocational Committee to work with them.

Necessary
The new committee becomes necessary now that the school has been designated a composite school and will soon incorporate a technical and vocational wing. The vocational committee will be composed of eight members, including two employers in manufacturing, agriculture, commerce or other industry, two employees from the same fields, the board chairman, the public school representative, the separate school representative, and another board member.

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OTTAWA REPORT

BI-MONTHLY OBSERVATIONS BY SANDY BEST, M.P. FOR HALTON

The Kennedy visit certainly grabbed its share of headlines in Ottawa and across the country. This was justified.

I can remember three years ago the pleasant speech of President Eisenhower on the floor of the House of Commons. With all respect to that great soldier and statesman, I and many others were rather disappointed at the lack of content in the speech itself. President Kennedy was quite different in his address on the floor of the House on Wednesday, May 17th. One might not agree with all the ideas he proposed but there was no question whatsoever that they were live vital issues and that they were given a strong selling approach by the youthful President.

Against
His urging of Canada to join the Organization of American States was noteworthy. The word up here is that many of the officials of the Department of External Affairs seem to be against this and have been for a long period of time. In any case, the Government is carefully weighing this matter at the moment.

Urging stronger NATO forces with nuclear weapons and more integrated armaments followed. In addition to the President urged more economic studies and cooperation between the NATO nations, a wider food disposal program for the needy countries of the world and the

are generally rumored to be hiding in protective duty among the Gold Leaf of the Commons roof. There were some large, towering policemen unobtrusively around but not as many as one might have thought from earlier reports. Incidentally, similar gentlemen were quite evident on Prime Minister MacMillan's visit.

Informality
The informality of President Kennedy and his wife and the President's obvious interest in shaking numerous hands on every occasion were warmly greeted. Ottawa had a festival air with numerous American flags with varying numbers of stars, and tens of thousands of tulips wondering whether to bloom in the extremely variable temperatures. The red coated mounties are always colorful but this time the Force had obviously brought in all of the seven foot men that it could muster!

Extended
Many of the President's thoughtful and well-termed phrases were used throughout his address. Freedom must not only be defended, but must be actively extended, he said. The galleries were crowded and tens of thousands lined the streets of Ottawa. I was fortunately able to obtain seats in the House of Commons for guests I had in Ottawa from Georgetown. These seats were as scarce as hen's teeth. I did not notice any of the little men with guns who
