### WHAT COUNCIL DID

**Only \$35,000 Loan Necessary for School**

Council approved preparation of a \$35,000 borrowing by law Monday to cover half the cost of a cafeteria planned for Georgetown's new composite high school.

Board member Fred Masterson explained to council that senior governments are providing the complete construction cost of the large addition to the present high school other than the \$35,000.

Cost to the town, however, will be reduced to about \$8,000, as Esquessing will share almost 17% of the \$35,000 and a government grant will pay part of the balance.

**Larger Share** — The school will be a tremendous asset, and you're not seeing it half as much as you did on your first visit," joked Mayor Hyde. Originally, it was believed the town would be paying a much larger share of the near-million dollar addition in the planning stage.

But recently, provincial and federal governments have indicated they will pay total costs of technical wings.

Mr. Masterson explained that the board plans occupational rooms for slower learners, as well as the technical subjects.

**Every Student** — "For the first time we will be able to give educational training to every student, and we're taking advantage of government aid while we can. I don't know how long Santa Claus will be in business," he said.

A \$600 watermain extension to supply the new Standard Products addition on the highway and a \$1200 eight inch watermain on River Drive to service the Varian plant were ordered by council.

**Twenty Dollars** — Council finalized the problem of a representative on the new county industrial committee by granting a \$20 per meeting rate to Cr. Wm. F. Hunter to attend twice-monthly meetings. "Whether we like the new committee or not, we're going to have to participate," said Cr. Jim Emmerson. "Other members are getting paid and we can't expect Cr. Hunter to waste a day without recompense."

### Served as Rector At St. George's

Archdeacon A. Cameron Mackintosh, 84, who died on Saturday in St. Peter's Infirmary, Hamilton, will be remembered by many Georgetown Anglicans. Following the retirement of the late Archdeacon W.G.O. Thompson in 1954, the archdeacon acted as rector at St. George's Church until the appointment of Rev. Kenneth Richardson. He commuted each Sunday from Hamilton for services for several months.

Archdeacon Mackintosh, who was given an honorary doctor of divinity degree by Trinity College, University of Toronto, in 1938, had served in Colborne as rector at St. Paul's Church, Fort Erie; St. James Church, Guelph, and for 27 years at St. James Church, Dundas, until his retirement in 1949.

Born in Ireland, he was educated in the National School in Ireland and Dorchester College, Oxford.

He taught school in South Africa before the turn of the century, and during the Boer War served with the Royal Irish Fusiliers until he was taken prisoner. He was imprisoned in the same camp as Sir Winston Churchill.

He was ordained on coming to Canada in 1900, with his first charges at St. Joseph's Island in the district of Algoma and Burk's Falls.

Archdeacon Mackintosh, who was made archdeacon in 1918, is believed to have served in that capacity longer than any other clergyman in the Anglican Church in Canada. Since his retirement he acted as chaplain of hospitals in Hamilton until a few years ago.

He served as chaplain with the 102nd Westworth Regiment during the Second World War and was severely wounded. He became active in the reserve army on his return from overseas, and with the Royal Canadian Legion, of which he was vice-chairman of the provincial command and chairman of the Ontario Poppy Day committee.

He held an honorary life membership with the Royal Canadian Legion.

He also took great interest in theological education and was responsible for seven young men entering the ministry. Some time ago he started a fund in the diocese of Niagara for divinity students.

He leaves his wife, Terese, a daughter, Mrs. Berald Burns of Waterdown; a son, Douglas, who is secretary-treasurer of the diocese of Toronto for the Anglican Church, and four grandchildren.
