"A W.A. member's allegiance should be first to her church, and secondly to the W.A.," said Mrs. T. E. Kellett, diocesan president of the W.A. of the Niagara diocese, when she spoke at a meeting at St. George's church recently.
The meeting opened with the singing of the hymn "Hark, creation's Alleluia, rising from a thousand shores." The local president Mrs. S. Walker led with the W.A. and Lord's prayer. The lesson, the 13th chapter of Corinthians, was read by Mrs. W. Chaplin, and Psalms 48 and 49, responsively, led by Mrs. J. Shields. Mrs. Walker welcomed the guests and introduced the guest speaker.

Phases
Mrs. Kellett spoke of all phases of the work of the W.A. This includes the "Dorecas" department, which sends material offerings to residential schools, hospitals, chapels, etc. and to the other areas of work in Canada and overseas. The "Educational Department," Christian Social Service which includes visiting the sick, the widower, the aging, the ex-convict, youth work, the Girls' Auxiliary, the Junior Auxiliary, the "Little Helpers" department which is concerned with little children from the time of their baptism, until they are seven years of age. Prayer Partnership The "Living Message" the official W.A. magazine, The Financial Department, with three principal funds: United Prayer, United Thank-offering, United Appeals.

Interest
The purpose of the W.A. is to enlist the interest and active participation of women and girls in the mission of the church to pray, to learn, to work, to give. Mrs. Kellett said that the W.A. provides 51% of the budget of the Anglican Church at home and abroad.
When an older member of a family reaches the age of 75 years, the younger ones rally round to aid and support them. Mrs. Kellett said she should be with the W.A. which is celebrating its 75th anniversary this year.
