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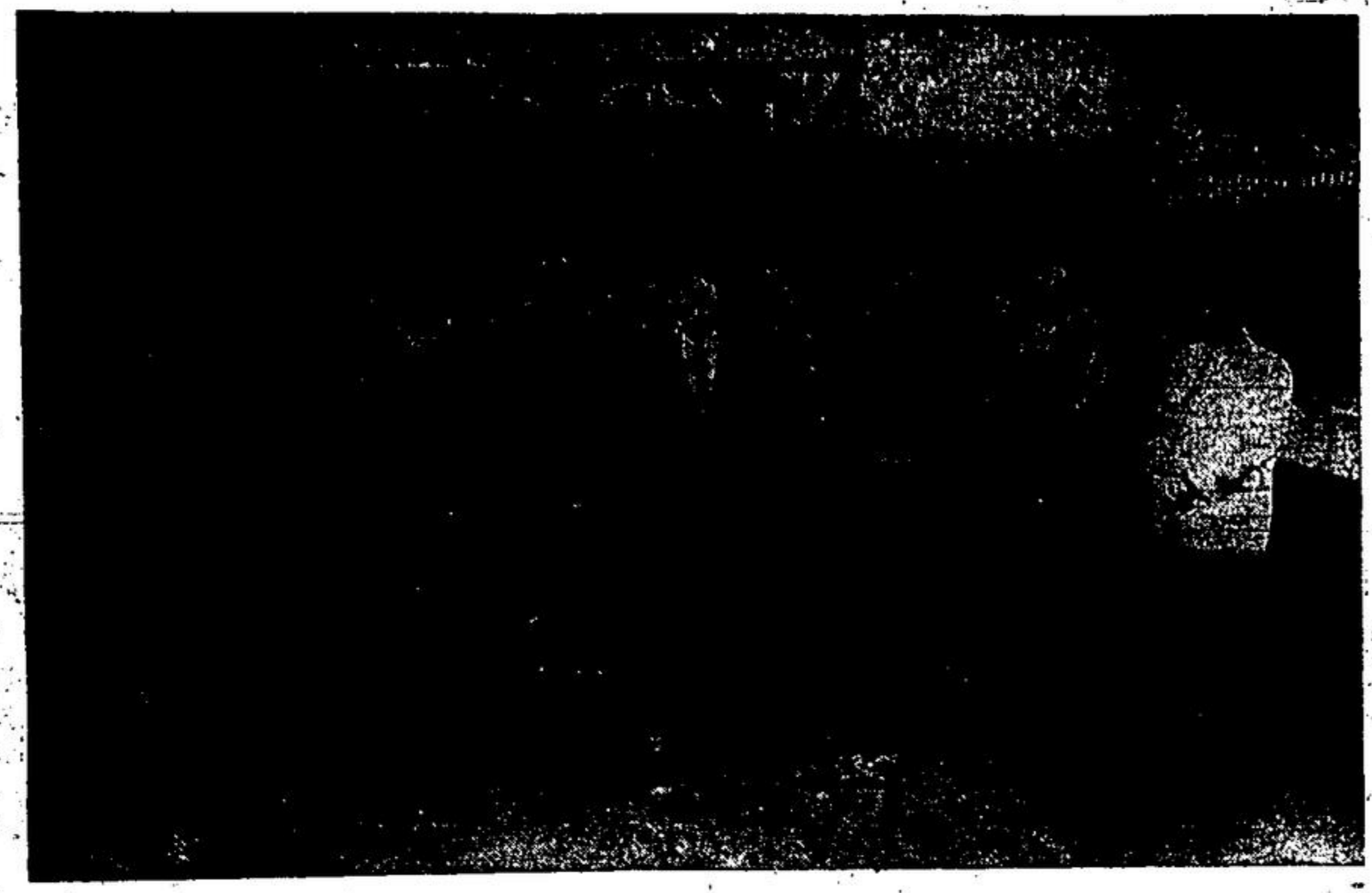


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### HYDRO CREWS SET RECORD

### District Pioneer Passes In Fort Erie Hospital

Funeral service was held last week for Roy E. Choate, one of the district's best known residents. For close to half a century Mr. Choate conducted his barber shop at 13 Queen St. W., Brampton.

He died suddenly in the Douglas Memorial Hospital, Ft. Erie. He was 77.

Of Empire Loyalist stock, the Choate family was among Brampton's pioneers, coming here from Pennsylvania. They ran the Old Graham House hotel on Main Street South from 1805 until 1910.

Mr. Choate began his apprenticeship as a barber in 1899, but helped his father in the hotel until prohibition was introduced. He then opened his Queen St. barber shop, operating it until 1957 when he sold to Ray Smith.

Mr. Choate was born in Ridge-way, in the Niagara district. He was keenly interested in the outdoors and was known to many as an ardent fisherman and hunter. He worked with the Peel County Game and Fish farm and was instrumental in stocking many of the district streams. Many years ago he stocked Heart Lake with small-mouthed bass.

He was also fond of sports-playing lacrosse and having an active interest in hockey.

Mr. Choate was a member of the Presbyterian Church. He was chaplain of the Flower City Lodge, AF & AM, a member of the Masonic Lodge and of the Black Knights.

He and his wife, the former Flossie B. McDowell, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last September at their home, 281 Main St. N. They were married in Limehouse.

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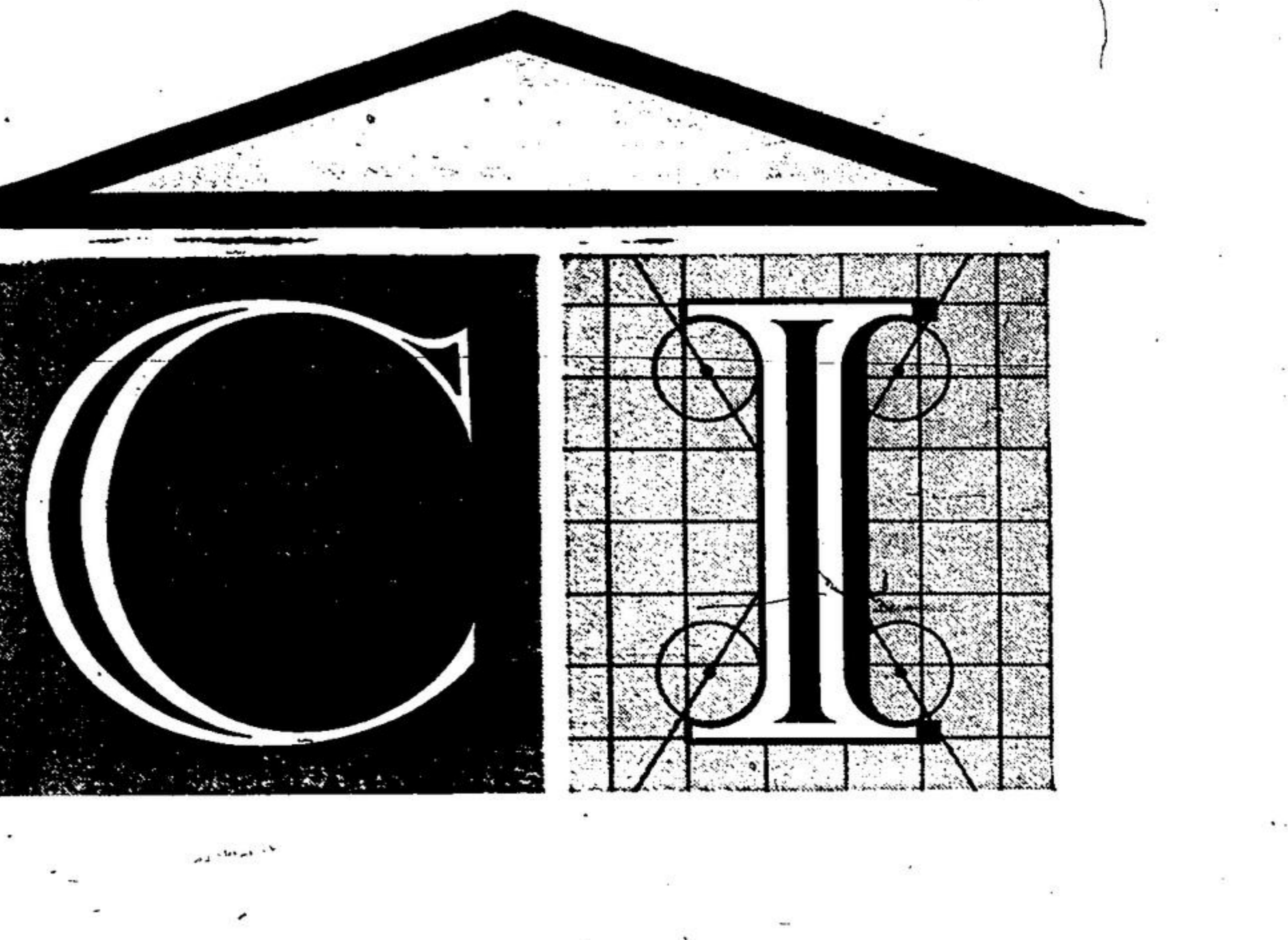
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
