School children will be able to see through it on Thursday, the general public on Friday afternoon and evening, and of course, Saturday afternoon, after the official opening, when the greater part of the crowd will attend, and again on Sunday morning for the Senior Citizens, and on Sunday afternoon once again the general public will be shown through.

It is hoped that the citizens of Georgetown will take this invitation to see through this wonderful new civic building, and that everyone will be on hand Saturday afternoon. Coffee will be served to all there. Those in charge confidently expect a crowd of some several thousand present.

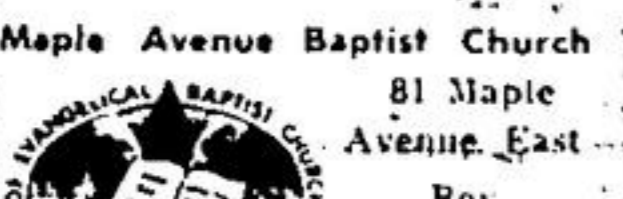
