250 Acre Park Resort For Speyside District

Workmen and heavy machinery are gouging out four lakes and a 250 acre resort area on top of the escarpment just south of Speyside in a development, backers say, will total \$250,000.

Twin Lakes Resort and Ranch, developers report, will include a trailer park for 100 units, camping grounds, four lakes covering 20 acres, a parking lot for 500 cars, a colonial style clubhouse and dance floor, huge barbecue pits and fireplaces, quarter mile race track around a lake, 100 smaller barbecue pits, two hundred picnic tables, twenty four cabins, six change houses, three tennis courts, lawn bowling green, badminton courts, outdoor checker and chess courts, supervised children's playground, hard and soft ball diamonds, archery and rifle ranges and horseback riding.

Sell Memberships

In an interview Wednesday, officials explained memberships were to be sold at \$10 annually five years in advance for a family. A membership of 2,000 families was the objective with facilities in the development planned for 8,000 people. Most items would be free to members with charges for tennis, horseback riding, rodeo performances, dancing, dining and the golf driving range.

On the track circling the one lake, riding, sulky, motorcycle and stock car racing would be provided for, with water sports on the lake between events.

Air Strip, Golf

Plans for next year include an air landing strip and a golf course, developers report.

The club house will be in the converted house on the property with the second floor opening on to a sun deck over the dance floor that will circle the present house. The dining room will look over one of the lakes.

Four Lakes

The four lakes, gouged out of the swamp, bush and rock will be spring fed, all interconnected and some of the water will be recirculated to raise the temperature for swimming, it was reported.

The barn on the property is being converted with the lower floor for stabling the anticipated 24 horses and the upper floor for sales and rental space. Archery, tenting and other equipment will be rented there as well as novelties being sold.

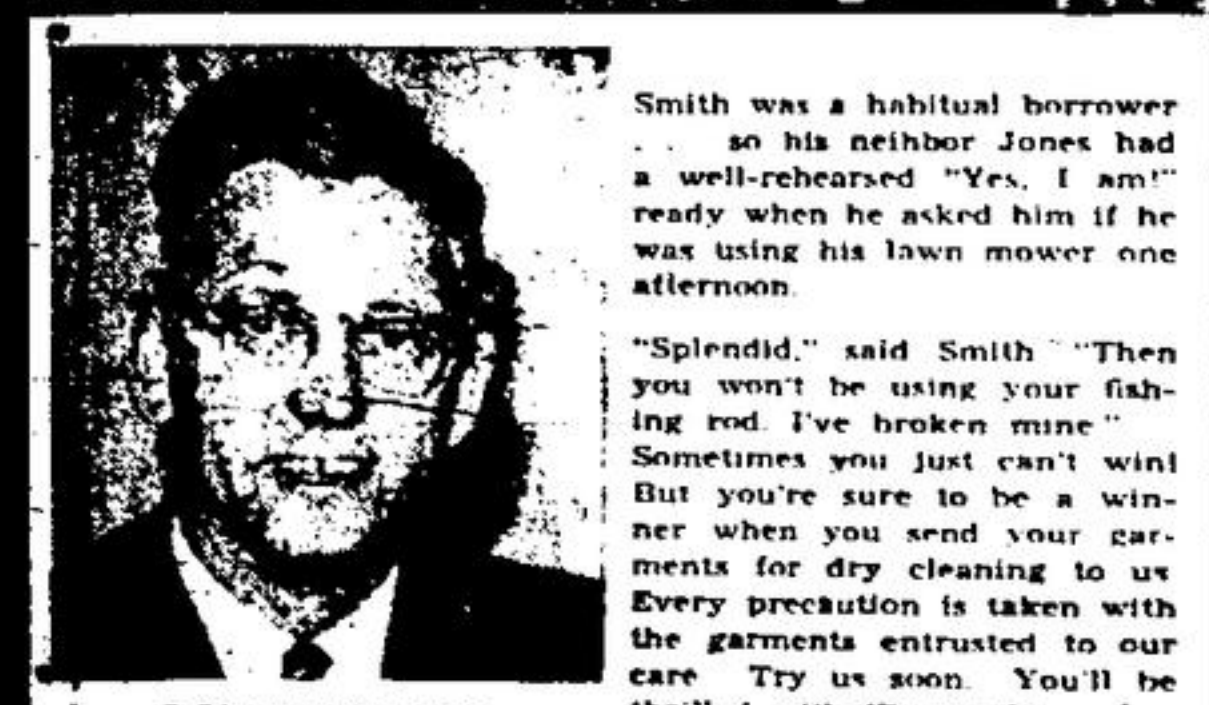
Swimming

The three lakes that will provide the swimming facilities will be sand bottom and sand beach.

Promotion of the project is by Twin Lakes Resorts with partial financing by Mulmer Swiss Resorts Ltd. of Honeywood. A liquor licence for the club house is anticipated, developers report.

Present opening date for the project is scheduled for early July weather permitting. In the meantime access to the property is difficult because of a narrow road, and developers are anxious to curtail traffic that will hamper work in progress.

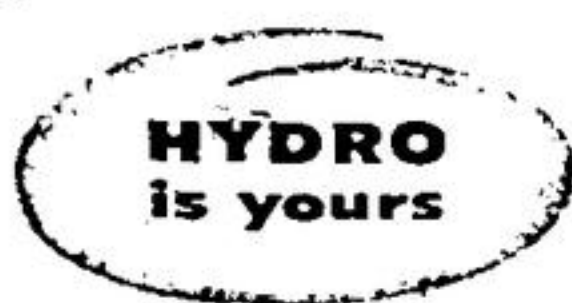
