### May Add New Zoning Category in Housing

Creation of a new residential zoning category, R1-Modified, is a possibility in Georgetown, according to Cr. Ian Cass.

On Monday, Cr. Cass said the town planning board is recommending the new category which would allow houses of 1200 square foot floor space if they had an attached garage. Present R1 regulations call for 1350 sq. ft.

#### Encourage R2

"The board feels there is an excess of R1 building lots in town and a shortage of R2. This would encourage building of a type that the town finds desirable," he explained.

Mayor Hyde added that any change would be made only in areas which are unbuild, and no R1 Modified homes would be allowed in areas which already contain R1 homes.

#### Moore Park

The planning board has also made a recommendation for zoning in the Moore Park subdivision, Cr. Cass said. There would be 109 R2 homes, with the balance R3, plus industrial and commercial areas and a special Block E of open space adjoining a public school site on the property.

### Claim Dogs Damage Poultry and Livestock

Extensive damage to poultry and livestock by dogs, was reported to Esquering Council Monday night, by livestock evaluator N. Stark. He reported a calf killed and three injured, seventeen goslings killed, and a peahen sitting on eggs destroyed.

Under the provisions of the Poultry and Livestock Act, the owners must be reimbursed by the township.

A letter read by Mr. Mackenzie Alexander of Lot 7, the 10th Line, could have far reaching implications. The letter, from Premier Frost's office, stated that it would seem that a Planning Board does not have the authority to charge an amount for school costs, to separate a lot. In Esquering the amount has been \$300 a separation.

Reeve C. Sinclair said "the money goes to a capital reserve fund." "What are you going to do with it?" asked Mr. Alexander. "We haven't decided, but we'll put it to good use," replied the Reeve. "I can put the \$300 to better use," opined Mr. Alexander.

The matter was left there for the meantime.

Executive meetings have been suspended until the fall and the next is planned on September 11th at the home of Mrs. Boyd Garland.

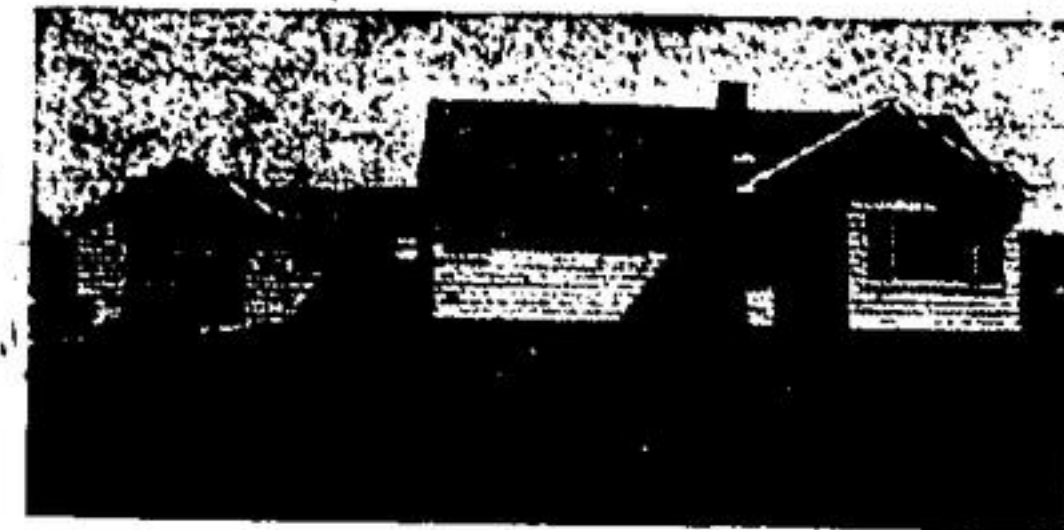

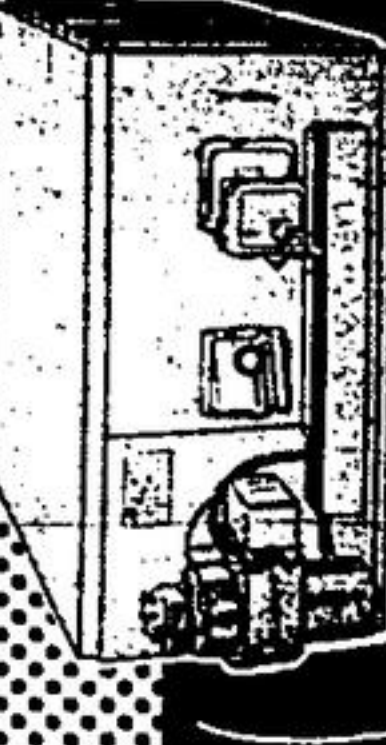
