

Safety League Award For Fatality-Free Year

Last year's record in safety, under 100 accidents over a twelve year period, may be shattered this year according to figures released by the Georgetown Police Department.

Traffic Safety Officer Ted Scott said Monday that to date only 35 reportable accidents have been recorded by police compared with 54 at this time last year.

Five Years

Cst. Scott commended the School Boy Patrol at Harrison Public School. During the five years since the patrol's inauguration no boy or girl from that school has been involved in an accident while going to or from school. Patrol boys must have an 80% average or better and if their marks slip they are removed from the patrol.

Other schools, however, are this year following Harrison's lead. Since the public and separate schools opened in September last year not a boy or girl has been involved in a motor vehicle accident.
