**OUTDOORS SPORTSMEN**

At the last Session of the Legislature of Ontario the offence of hunting carelessly was enacted as follows:

11. 66A. Every person is guilty of the offence of hunting carelessly who, being in possession of a firearm or airgun for the purpose of hunting, discharges or causes to be discharged, or handles such firearm or airgun without due care and attention or without reasonable consideration for persons or property and is liable to a fine of not more than \$500 or to imprisonment for a term of not more than six months, or to both.

This law will not stop hunting accidents, only YOU, the hunter can do that but it does put some teeth in a law that will help the conservation officers, provincial police and local police round up some of these hunters that use no common sense when out hunting.

Prior to this section the only charge available for hunting accidents was criminal negligence. To convict on criminal negligence it is necessary to show a wanton and reckless disregard for the lives and safety of others. It was, of course, difficult to convince juries that an accused be a hunter or a motorist is guilty of such a serious breach.

To convict under the new Section of hunting carelessly it is not necessary to prove criminal negligence. It is only necessary to show a breach or failure to handle the firearm with the degree of care that any reasonable proficient or skillful hunter is expected to have. In other words, the degree of carelessness is the same as with careless driving.

Some 34 Cubs of the 4th Georgetown Cub Pack were given some gun safety instructions by Don Hancock, Don Powers, Fred Spiros, Ian Presgrave and yours truly on Tuesday night at the club's rifle range and then were given the chance of shooting at targets under the close supervision of the club members. And from the expressions on the kids' faces, it was the biggest thrill of their lives.

Don't pass up any streams around Georgetown when you are looking for some trout fishing. This is finding out more and more every time I drop a line into "some of these streams hereabouts."

Last Monday evening I tried Stewarttown, and from 8' to 7' of water, 200 yards from the 7th line came one 12 1/2" speckled trout weighing 1 1/2 lbs. and not only that but his bigger brother go away from me.

But I wasn't sorry, as the one I landed, stood on his tail and did a 60 second dance for me. And in a fisherman's eyes, Cleopatra couldn't have done better.

A worm harness seems to be more effective when fishing with worms for trout, but this can prove expensive when you are setting a lot of snags, so why not make your own. Just tie two or three hooks, one or two inches apart. This can be done right on your spinning line or make up a few leaders using some old discarded line.

If any of the fishermen around Georgetown are interested in forming a trout club, I would like to have your name, address and phone number.

The American League saw the only large score of the evening with the Twins beating the Orioles handily 14-3. However, this was only the first game, so beware of the Orioles the next time.

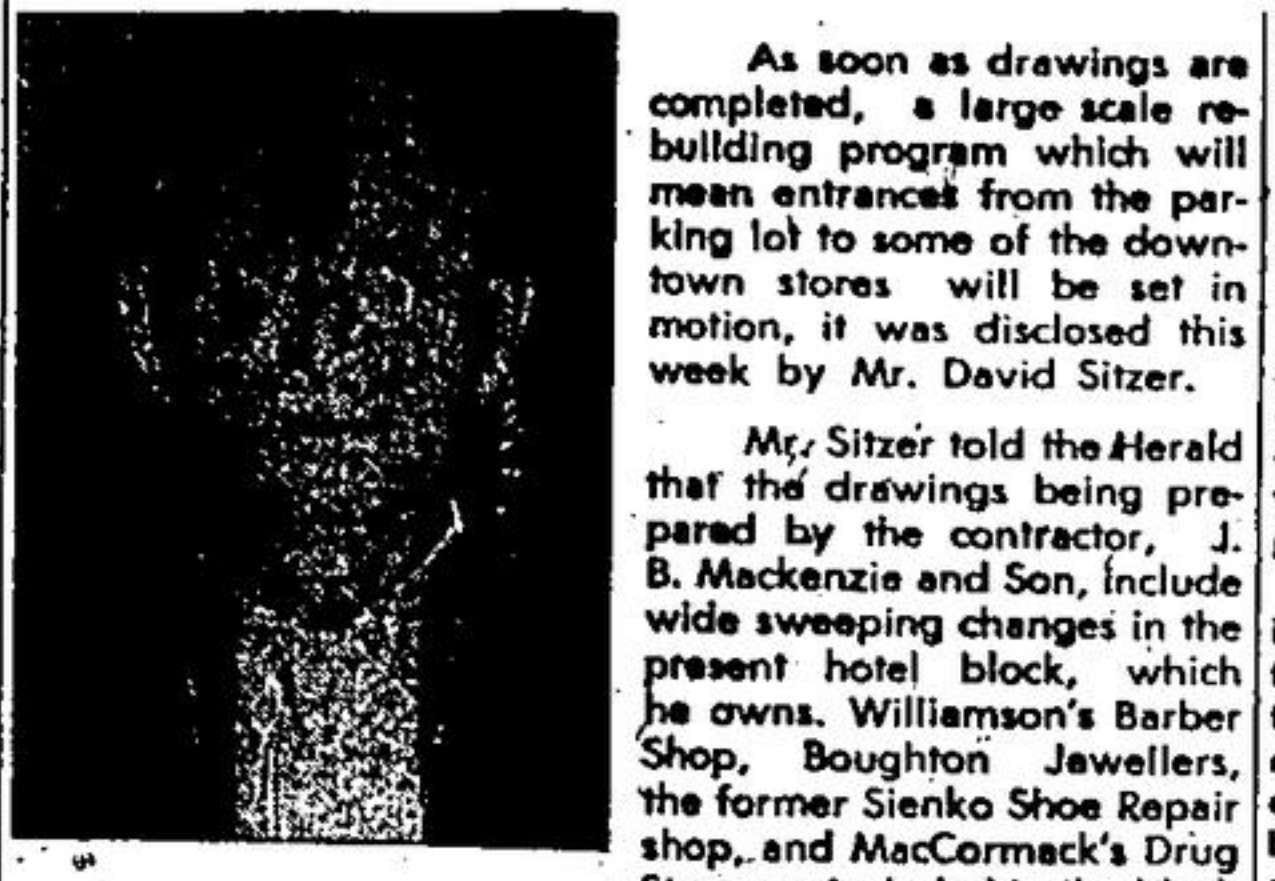

**Planning Rear Entrances For Some Downtown Stores**



As soon as drawings are completed, a large scale rebuilding program which will mean entrances from the parking lot to some of the downtown stores will be set in motion, it was disclosed this week by Mr. David Sitzer.

Mr. Sitzer told the Herald that the drawings being prepared by the contractor, J. B. Mackenzie and Son, include wide sweeping changes in the present hotel block, which he owns. Williamson's Barber Shop, Boughton Jewellers, the former Sienko Shoe Repair shop, and McCormack's Drug Store are included in the block to be renovated.

The store areas will be extended toward the parking lot with entrances at either end and the present store fronts will be completely modernized to keep pace with Georgetown's downtown "new look." The extensions will come even with the rear of Holmes 5c to \$1.00 store creating a "plaza" type of effect on the parking area.

The hotel itself is also feeling the hammer and paint brush. In two weeks work is slated to begin on a program of remodelling in the dining room. New draperies, and new furniture are already on order to complement the new colours chosen for the dining room.

Painters, in fact, will go right through the entire building from top to bottom to freshen the interior. Work on the entrance is already in process.

The installation of new radiators and duct work completed two weeks ago put heat on the third floor for the first time.
