Weak Hitting Locals Walloped by Milton
Georgetown's Intermediate A ball team, a medium strength defensive club with a sufficient pitching staff, apparently is missing one important component — hits.
In Milton Sunday, Georgetown went hitless in 7 of 9 innings in taking a 14 to 1 shellacking from the Red Sox. Georgetown managed to hit safely only four times in the entire ball game, 3 times in the 5th inning when they scored their only run.
Meanwhile the potent bats of Cully, Shannon, Hannan, and Hyatt were pacing the Milton hitters in a 14 hit attack that kept the Georgetown bullpen perpetually active.
Left hander Dave Hart who started and reliever Paul Dora had both departed before the 4th, when junker Glen Gibbs came on to buffet the Miltonites, but too much damage had been done for the comparatively quiet local bats to repair. Marks started on the mound for Milton and found the going rocky from the middle frame. But not rocky enough to keep him from completing the game.
Marks gave up walks to Bibb and McLaglan, and singles to King, Breen and Bafrager for Georgetown's only score. Breen was the only Georgetown hitter who touched all four bases.
Fanned 11.
Milton collected the only extra base hits, four of them, and left 9 men stranded to Georgetown's 5. Georgetown pitching gave up 10 bases on balls while Milton's Marks allowed only four free trips, and struck out 11. Gibbs for the locals fanned four and starter Hart struck out one.

Car, Truck Collide Lady is injured
Mrs. Dirk Voskamp of Esquimaux, a passenger in a truck being driven by her husband was treated for a cut over her right eye and back injuries when a car driven by Jack Robert Saunders, 24 John St. E., collided with the Voskamp vehicle from behind downtown Friday night.
Both the truck and the car were traveling west on Mill at the time of the accident. The vehicles were in a line of traffic approaching the busy Main intersection.
The Voskamp truck, a 1952 International, and the car, a 1956 Ford, suffered approximately \$300 damage in the smash, according to the police report. The injured woman is due to give birth to a child in July. The accident occurred at about 8:35 p.m. and was investigated by Cst. Ted Scott.

Severely Injured in Unusual Park Accident
A twenty-one year old Toronto man, Samuel Preddy, of 103 Scott Rd. is in Toronto General Hospital today with a broken spine and internal injuries, the result of a macabre accident in a dark corner of the fair grounds during the early minutes of Sunday morning.
According to police, Dirk Jansen of R.R. 4, Acton, the driver of a 1953 Meteor was starting home from the Rodeo Day wind-up square dance, just past midnight, when the accident occurred. Unfamiliar with the layout of the track infield where his car was parked, Jansen drove to the edge of the track in the west corner but was unable to proceed further because of a drop there, which was too steep to drive over.
As Jansen started to make a sharp turn to the right in low gear he felt the right front corner of the car raise, slightly. He immediately stopped and backed up. When he left the car to check the obstruction he found the injured man lying at the front wheel.
Dr. C. A. Thompson, a member of the Lions, happened to be near by and was assisted by the ever present St. John Ambulance men. Other Lions near the accident scene, George Hewson and William Bailey summoned the police and ambulance.
Police said the man had apparently been lying on the ground and there was nothing to indicate that he had been knocked down by the car. A piece of dark denim material tipped from the injured man's clothing was found hanging under the front of the car. Bystanders said they had seen the man in the area earlier looking for his glasses.

Prospects Bright for New Industry
Prospects are bright that a large American firm will locate a branch plant here this year.
The company has been negotiating for some time for purchase of a large tract of land from Delta Developments and had optioned a property until June 30th. At the same time, the town council optioned an adjoining acre at \$2500 from the Delta firm with the understanding that this would be sold at the same price to the new firm if required.
The firm has meanwhile extended its option until July 31 and on Monday council did likewise.
Good news was contained in a portion of a letter which Mayor Huxce read from the company president which said: "We hope to be in operation in Georgetown yet this year, should we not run into any difficulty."
