**Salary Raise for Esqueuing Township Officials, Council**

**Developers Seek Permit For Recreation Area**

A \$200 a year raise for Council members was approved by Esqueuing Council Monday night. This brings their yearly salaries to \$500.

Salary increases of \$400 annually were also approved for the Clerk, Treasurer, Assessor, and Road Superintendent bringing their salaries to \$4000 a year. A \$200 increase was also given to Mrs. Bouskill in the office.

Mr. J. Brower and Mrs. A. Phillips, representatives of Twin Lakes Developments, a proposed recreation area on Highway 25, near Speyside, showed Council their plan. The 250 acre development as envisaged by the owners, has swimming areas, camping sites, picnic grounds, barbecues, tennis courts, cabins, and a club house and lounge.

The problem of issuing the \$50,000 building permit arose when Building Inspector Huls

informed Council the land was leased not owned by Twin Lakes Developments Ltd. "Can we give the building permit in your name when you don't own the land?" asked Reeve Sinclair.

"As far as I can see we'll have to deal with the Badwins, who own the land," stated Coun. George Leslie.

The matter ended with Mr. Brower promising to bring back the building permit application signed by both Twin Lakes and Mrs. Baldwin.

"Bullets are flying over us," was the dramatic statement made by Mr. George Smith, a farmer near Norval. "You don't suppose Norval has declared war on you," quipped the Reeve. Mr. Smith went on to tell of many episodes of bullets flying past him and his family.

"Many a time I've had to run for the house," added Mr. G. Casely, who accompanied him.

"Do you think it's just kids blasting away?" asked Coun. Geo. Leslie. "I never go close

enough to find out," replied Mr. Casely.

Reeve Sinclair promised to get in touch with the game warden and see what could be done.

"Is there any by-law protecting residential areas when a gravel pit is right beside them?" asked Mr. J. Evans, of Concession 8, Esqueuing.

"We have no zoning by-law," answered the Reeve, "and even if we had, that gravel pit was there five years ago, before any of the houses."

"It was only on one lot then," replied Mr. Evans. "When we bought the land we were told the gravel pit was dead, and wouldn't be worked. Instead it has expanded," he contended.

"As it stands now," said Coun. George Leslie, "I don't know what we can do." "In that case, we will have to appeal our Assessment," said Mr. Evans.

In answer to a request for calcium on the road, Reeve Sinclair told Mr. Evans they would put calcium in front of houses, but not where land is vacant.

Land separations of under ten acres will be limited to a maximum of one a year, and a total of four, off any one hundred acre property as a result of a by-law passed Monday night.

A land area of under twenty acres may only be separated every five years for a total of two separations.

A fee of \$200 to be deposited in a capital reserve fund will be charged in each separation. However, commercial, industrial and family separations will be at the discretion of the Planning Board.

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**Liberal Nominee Heads Oakville Medical Staff**

In Milton Town Hall, jam packed with 350 enthusiastic Liberals, Dr. Harry Harley of Oakville was chosen Liberal standard bearer for Halton County in the next federal election on Friday.

The atmosphere was not unlike a revival meeting with "logans all over the wall." "I'm just wild about Harry," "Keep Halton healthy with Harley," and one with poetic license, "Best Failed the Test, Get Rid of the Pest."

All Declined The other nominees who all declined in favour of Dr. Harley, were Michael Mutzak, Lester A. Whiting and a surprise nominee Kenneth Dick, a former Liberal candidate.

"A spark to ignite Halton County" was Dr. Harley's description of the enthusiasm generated at the meeting. The nominee attacked the demise of the Avro Arrow in light of the recent ordering of the conventional Voodoos from the States. "Only the social benefits introduced by the Liberal party have saved the Conservatives from complete disaster," he stated. "Is it a coincidence that bad times and a Conservative government go hand in hand," he demanded.

Referring to demands for Governor Coyne's resignation, he charged, "They are looking for a scapegoat on which to hang their financial policies."
