#### Stained Window is Dedicated by Bishop

Two hundred and eight parishioners and their friends, of St. Alban's and St. Paul's Anglican churches, Glen Williams and Norval, assembled last Sunday morning in the newly decorated St. Paul's Church for the institution of their rectory Rev. Ronald Stubby and for the confirmation of thirty candidates from the parish and two from Milton Parish.

Bishop Walter F. Bagnall, Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Niagara, instituted the rectory, and confirmed the candidates. The window and panels were designed by Miss Marjorie Kazer, the well known Georgetown artist whose religious

works adorn churches across Canada. The window represents Christ in Glory, and the panels are the Commandments, Our Father and the Creed, lettered with charmingly illustrated little pictures, replacing punctuation marks. The window and panels commemorate the 115th anniversary at St. Paul's.

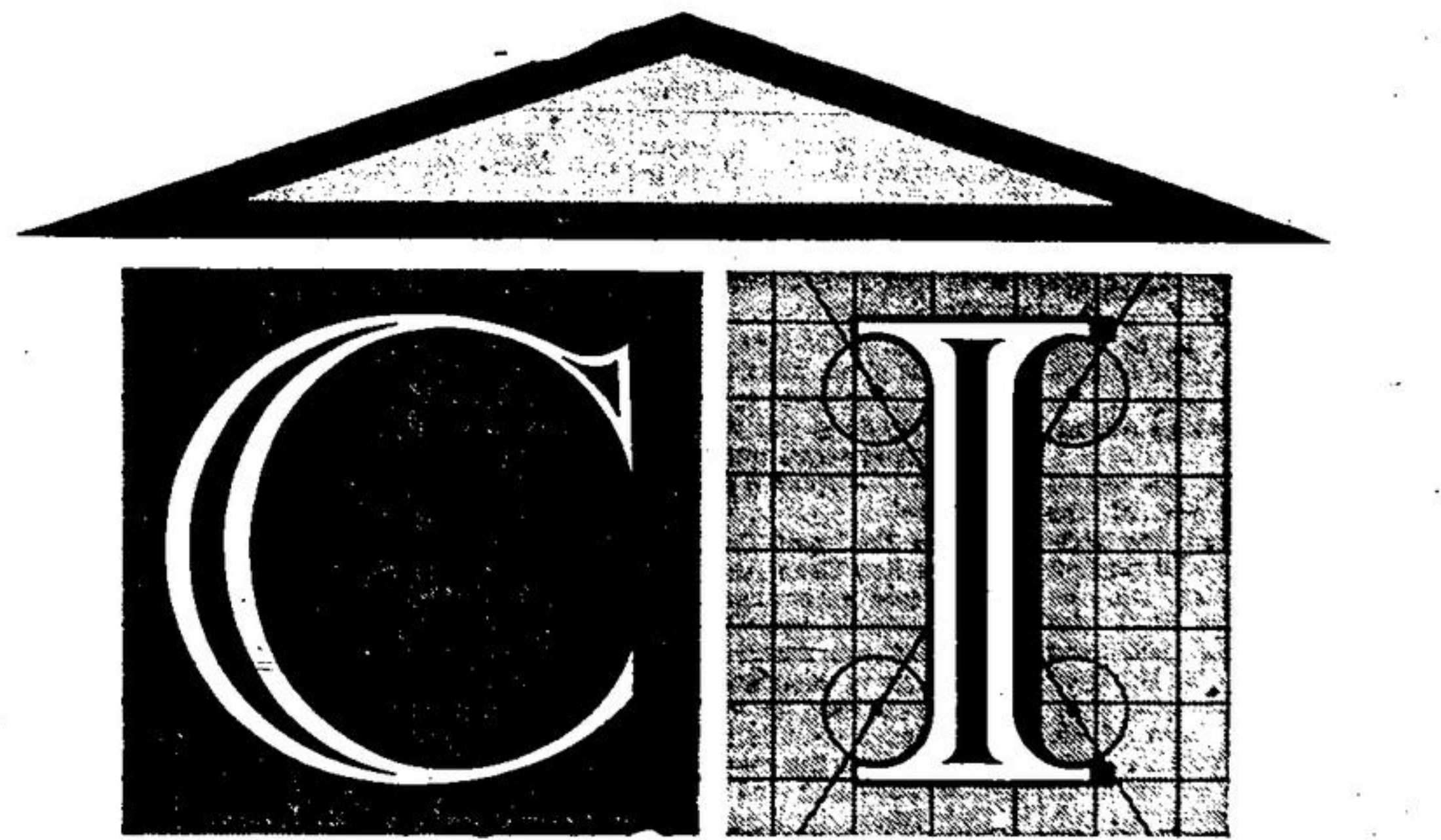
