Runs Out Of Gas — Misses Race Prize

A misjudgment in gas mileage knocked popular Georgetown race car driver, Grant Clark out of a probable win at Canada's newest and most unique track when it opened last week.

Striking Distance
Racing at Mosport Park, 60 miles east of Toronto, Grant in a tiny Morris 850 had the crowd with him as he piloted the small car from his last place post position to within striking distance of the pacesetter with just two laps to go, when the unexpected happened — he ran out of gas.

The car was firmly entrenched in third spot and moving up fast when the race ended for Grant on the 8th lap of the 10 lap event. Though it failed to finish, the Minnie Minor as it has been tagged created, quite a sensation for its unexpected speed.

2½ Miles Circuit
The new Mosport track is a paved 2½ mile circuit which has been compared favourably by race drivers with other world famous circuits such as Le Mans, Nuburgring and Isle of Man.

Five years in the planning and developing stages, Mosport is a circuit designed especially for road racing, and is owned by all sports car club members in Ontario. There's a petition being circulated throughout the Lake Simcoe district for a closed season on white fish from October 6th until December 15th which takes in the spawning period of the white fish, and also limits the amount of fish taken by any one angler in one day to 25 fish. Although it wasn't mentioned in the petition, but I assume the possession limit would also be 25 fish.

It was also petitioned, that in the future only native whitefish be used when stocking Lake Simcoe. Yours truly was a little puzzled when informed that we have more than one type of white fish in Lake Simcoe.

Bill Sellers, who, with his Uncle Stan Sellers, owns and operates Brownie Boats of Jackson's Point, was explaining why most boathouse owners were all behind this petition.

Choose McLaren as All-Star Pitcher

One Georgetown player, pitcher-manager Lynn McLaren whose name was not even placed before the voting committee, was named to the Halton County Intermediate All-Star team Monday night in Milton.

The County All-Stars, which will play the U.S. import bolstered Galt Terriers in the annual all-star game in Campbellville on July 9th, is dominated by players from the powerful Campbellville Merchants. The 11 man roster includes 8 regulars and 3 pitchers.

Managers from the 7 Halton County Intermediate teams comprised the voting committee. Each submitted names of players from their own team but voted only for players from the other six clubs. A nominated player had to pick up at least four votes to win a spot.

Campbellville players fill 5 of the positions, Oakville 2, Milton, Acton, Dundas and Georgetown 1 each.

Eight alternates will be chosen at a later date.
