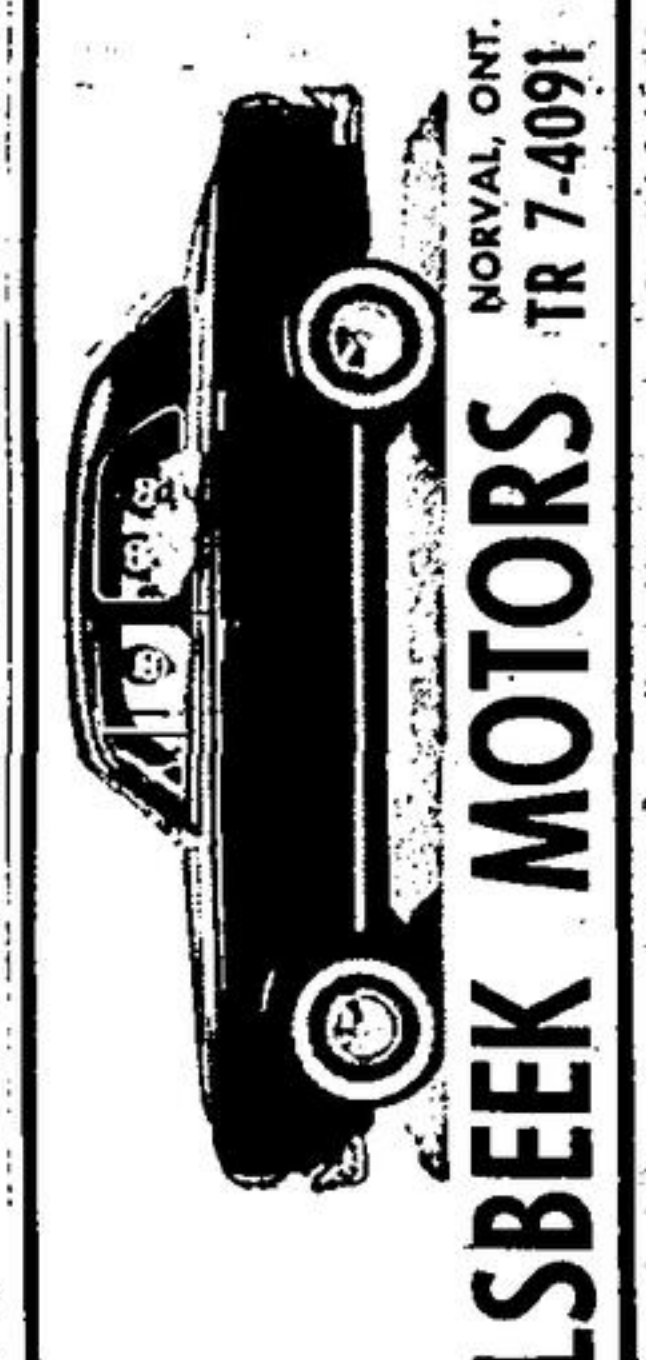

R-1 Modified Zoning Area Receives Council Support

A new modified R1 zoning area received initial council approval Monday when a by-law was ordered prepared to establish such a zone.

Presently R1 areas require a minimum area of 1350 square feet.

Attached Garage
The modified zone will allow houses of 1200 square feet, providing there is an attached garage which brings the house up to the old minimum size.

The new area will be in the Delrex subdivision and takes in an unopened tract on the east side of Rexway Drive. It was stressed that no new R1 Modified homes will be built in the field homes will about any present R1 homes. The ravine lands will continue in the R1 zone.

Hospital Open for Patients June 27th

First patients in Georgetown's new hospital will be admitted on June 27th, according to Graham Gilhooly, hospital administrator.

While facilities and staff are now ready for full operation of the hospital, it is necessary to take sanitary tests of every department in the building, Mr. Gilhooly explains, and this will be completed before June 27th.

At first a total of 39 beds will be available, 14 obstetrical and 25 medical and surgical beds. Later, as more trained staff becomes available, an additional 17 medical and surgical beds and eight pediatric will swell the final capacity to 64 beds.

SET RATES
A standard ward rate of \$20.30 daily has been established by the hospital board with approval of the Ontario Hospital Commission. Top rate in the building will be \$26.30 for a private room. Semi-private rooms will be \$23.30 daily.

However, regardless of these additional charges, if it is certified that a patient must have private or semi-private accommodation for medical reasons, the standard rate only will be charged.

HOSPITAL HOURS
Semi-open visiting hours have also been set. A patient may have visitors from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. in all zones other than the children's ward. Here, visiting hours end at 7:00 p.m.

Visitors will be limited to two per patient at any one time, and in common with hospital procedures, children under 13 will not be allowed at any time.

In the obstetrical section, visitors are limited to the new mother's husband and mother.

TIPS FOR PATIENTS
Admittance hours for patients, other than emergencies, will be from 2 to 3 p.m. for surgical and medical; and from 7 to 8 p.m. for medical patients only. Discharge hours for patients will be from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Patients are reminded to bring certificates of insurance coverage with them. Personal belongings should be limited to a minimum — toilet articles, razor, slippers, bathrobe and a few dollars for purchase of comforts if desired. The hospital has no adequate storage facilities for valuables and patients are warned not to bring any large sum of money, expensive jewellery or extra clothing other than what is worn of admittance.
