COUNTY COUNCIL

Cost of Proposed County Buildings Cut \$376,000

Estimated Expense Will Be \$924,000

\$376,000 was shaved off the cost of the proposed County Buildings last week, when Architect W. Armstrong submitted his second set of plans to County Council.

The first estimate of \$1,300,000 without furnishings, was deemed too high by County Council, and the architect was asked to cut the cost. The present estimated cost is \$924,000.

All Structural "The changes are all structural," explained the architect, "since the mechanical functions of the building cannot be reduced." The basement has been raised six or seven feet, so now it is the ground floor with windows six feet high. Here the Registry Office will be housed in a space 50' larger than the present quarters. "All the department heads and the Law Society are happy with the layout," added Mr. Armstrong.

The savings have been effected by cutting down the floor space, and changing the exterior materials. In addition there will be no interior paneling in the Court rooms, and the Council Chambers.

Just Office Building Opinions differed on the new building. Reeve Doug. Sergeant opined, "It's just another office building, not a County Building." Deputy Reeve H. Merry of Oakville commented, "because I saw the first plan, this one is spoiled for me. I think we've sacrificed too much."

Warden Alex Phillips reminded him, "We can't have our cake and eat it too." He went on to list the estimated costs of the items not included in the \$924,000. He cited architect's fees at \$56,000, furnishings between \$60,000 and \$70,000, and landscaping \$5,000.

After a plea by Reeve Mary Pettit, of Milton, for immediate

action on the building, a motion to accept the plan was passed, ed unanimously.

Current Revenue With Halton debtors debt standing at \$3,342,405, I would like to suggest the building be paid out of current revenue over the next 3 or 4 years," said Reeve L. Ryckman of Burlington.

Reeve E. Tilley of Oakville pointed out that before approving a by law the Municipal Board demands the method of financing be spelled out.

It was decided to initiate the by law on a debtors basis however, if another system proves feasible it may be amended.

The judges in Halton County have lost the right to park in an area in front of the Milton Court House marked "No Parking."

The Committee will consider establishing a small parking area on County property near the corner of Brown and Mary St. to Sept. 4.
