Some 3 years ago the GA & HA requested 5,000 brown trout to stock the lower Credit River - of this order they received 500 trout. Half of these were stocked above the dam and the remainder below the dam, located on River Road east of town. The remainder of this request-was forgotten until a short time ago, when George Hoars discovered that brown trout were being stocked in the river near Inglewood. With this information, George wrote to the Fisheries Branch of the Dept. asking why the club's pending order of trout had not been filled.

Three weeks passed when George received a reply. This reply is too long to reprint but after careful study of this letter by a few of the club members, it was decoded to mean the following. That brown trout being the most hearly and therefore the easiest fish to survive in transplanting and also that this trout has a more cannibalistic nature, and may tend to spoil off trout fish in rivers where hey are stocked.



And therefore the Department will not stock rivers with brown trout where there is a natural speckle trout unless the Dept, can be shown that they will be fished immediately after

It is for this reason that a peti tion will be circulated through town to collect signatures to show the Dept. that there is a good number of fishermen who have in the past and will in the future, fish the lower Credit

River. These petitions will be located throughout town with their locations published next week. And I wholeheartedly ask every fisherman to sign his name to this petition.
