**Trucker Instantly Killed In Accident at Wawa**

A tragic accident took the life of a former local man, Elwood Perryman, 38, when he was instantly killed at Wawa June 18th.

Mr. Perryman, who was employed with Bud's Transfer of Sault Ste. Marie, had arrived in Wawa with a large van carrying equipment for a truck rodeo planned there on Saturday. While unloading, a heavy starting gate suddenly tilted, pin-

ning him in the cab and causing instant death.

Born at Brougham, near Oshawa, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Perryman, R.R. 1, Georgetown. The family moved to Ballinfad when he was twelve. He was overseas for three years with the Canadian army, serving with the Carleton and York Regiment, later worked in Hespeler and Acton and was employed with Industrial Sand & Gravel and at Avro when he was a town resident on Victoria Ave. Four years ago, he moved to the Soo.

He leaves his wife, Dorothy Moore, six children, Judy, Sandy, Marilyn, Shirley, Bobby and Elwood; his parents and four sisters, Mrs. Jack Campbell (Jean) of Acton, Mrs. Lloyd Swindlehurst (Lena) of Ballinfad, Mrs. Jack Bryce (Betty) of Lorne Park and Mrs. Robert Heppburn (Georgina) of R.R. 1. A brother Allan was killed overseas in World War 2.

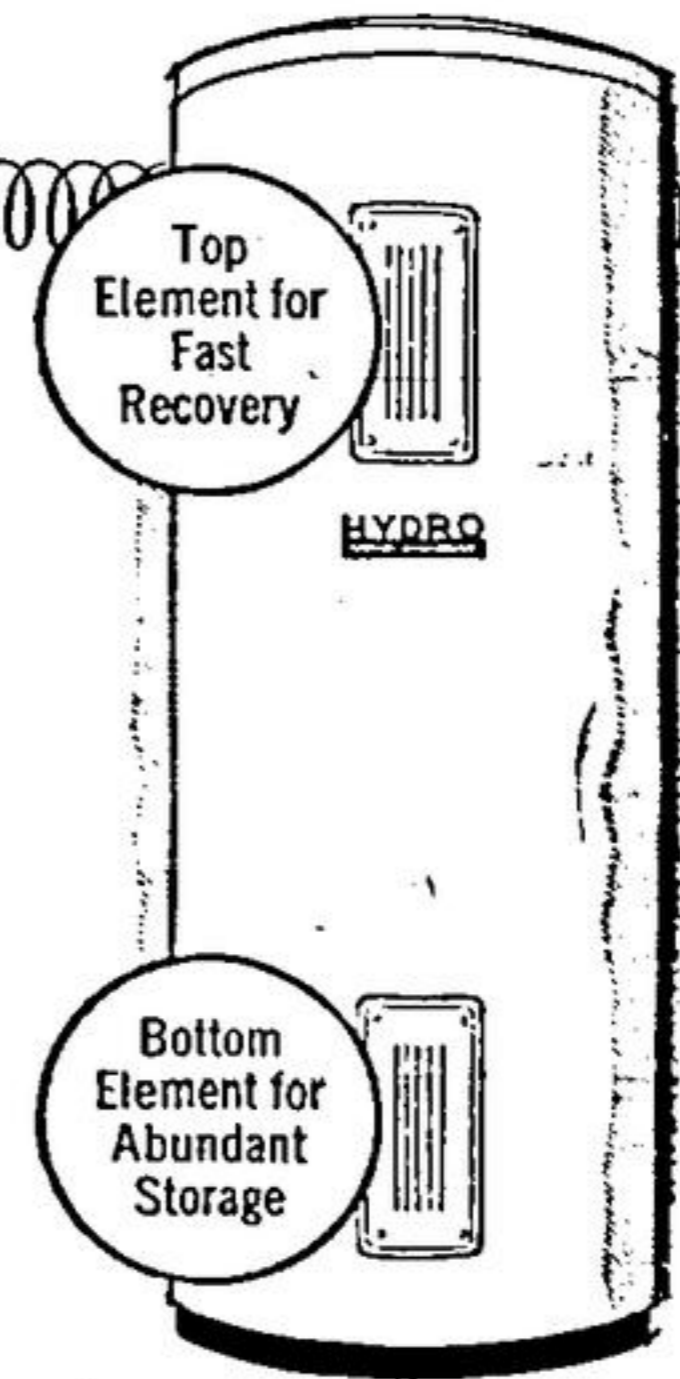
**QUEEN'S HOUSE**
