Bloody Trail is Left in Break-In

A trail of blood and fingerprints taken off two purses are all police have to go on in tracking-down the burglar who broke into the home of Bill South, 22 Tyers Ave. sometime late Saturday night or early Sunday morning.

Smashed Window
The break-in was discovered by Mr. South when he entered his house about 2 a.m. The prowler had apparently smashed a basement window with his fist to gain entry. A trail of blood probably from a cut in his hand or wrist weaved up the basement stairs and into the living room. Drops of blood were also discovered in the kitchen and in an upstairs bedroom.

Blood Stains
Samples of fingerprints taken off two purses which had been moved, and samples of the blood stains were taken and are being held pending an arrest.

Police said the suspect will have a scar on his hand or forearm. Nothing was reported missing to Constables Evan Rollins and Mike Christopher who are handling the investigation.

Council on Monday checked bids from three companies, and deferred a decision until a check was made on quotes submitted compared with similar jobs in Milton and other parts of the county.

Treatment
Cr. Ian Cass queried about gravel and dust treatment at the east end of Weber Drive and Delira Blvd. and was told by the town engineer that it is necessary to keep graveling and oiling in sequence and work would start there as soon as possible. If preliminary work is not followed by oiling within a week, it would boost costs, he pointed out.

Cr. Cass' opinion that if work is not to start soon, temporary relief should be given for dust was turned over to the road committee.

"I've read several comments about discoloured water in one of the local papers," said Cr. Burke, asking what might be the cause.

Hydrants
Engineer G. R. Bligh explained that this resulted in the east end from opening hydrants for street watering, and that trouble occurred downtown in water shut-offs during street reconstruction.

Cr. Ian Cass suggested that the water committee might discuss possibility of fluoridation at a future committee meeting.

A request from the mayor of Fredericton, N.B., for assistance in aiding flood victims in that province received a sympathetic hearing from Mayor Hyde who intimated it would be in order for perhaps a \$100 grant from the town. No action was taken on the matter, however.
