Georgetown High School's Technical Wing. At a meeting of the Georgetown High School District Board last Wednesday, trustees made a final survey of the sketch plans with architect A. E. Barnett of Barnett & Reider and came up with just fifteen minor practical modifications.

Circular Driveway Most obvious of these will be a circular driveway which wa! enable buses to load and unload at the main entrance. More stor age space was created in the commercial department and the sizes of some washrooms were altered slightly. Organizations renting the gymnatorium will be completely excluded from the rest of the building by folding steel gates which will close off

corridors leading out of the gym area When the building is completed, the present gym will be used exclusively by the girls, while the boys will use the new ene. The board is waiting for approval from Ottawa before put-
