Brownridge Descendents Hold Brampton Reunion

About 200 descendents of Thomas Brownridge, who emigrated to Canada from Yorkshire in 1819, gathered for a Family Reunion at Brampton Fair Grounds at 10 a.m. on Saturday, July 1st, 1961. This was the eleventh reunion since the first one, held on July 1st, 1907, on the family homestead — Lot 4, Concession 7, Esquesing Township — then owned and occupied by Joseph Brownridge, a son of the man who had homesteaded the land 88 years before.

On the Homestead
Thomas Brownridge married Eliza Ward of Islington and together they raised 7 sons and 1 daughter on the Homestead, which has remained in the family for all but 2 years of the 142 years since it was first established. J. Ward Brownridge, a great-great-grandson of the original settler has owned and occupied the homestead since 1950. He is president of the Brownridge Reunion Association. This year and presided over the gathering of the clan on Saturday.

Now Nearly 700
Descendants of the original settlers, now number nearly 700. Most of them live in Ontario but others are scattered all over this continent, but mainly in Western Canada and Michigan. Many from distant points attended the reunion. In honour of the departed members of the pioneer family, a Memorial Service was held in Ashgrove United Church at 2.30 p.m. on Sunday, July 2, to which friends and neighbours were invited.

Park School Students Visit Midland Huronia Museum

An account of Park Public School's Grade 7 tour of the Huronia District by pupil Richard Lenz.

Tuesday June 15 dawned bright and chilly. Drowsily, I stumbled out of bed, dressed and ate breakfast; but on leaving the house I no longer felt tired, for the excitement of this long awaited day had thoroughly awakened me. As I arrived at Park School, I found the rest of the Grade Seven class eagerly awaiting the bus. Soon we were all aboard for Midland; Mr. Emerson and Mrs. Leslie our teachers, locating themselves in the middle of our enthusiastic, talkative group.

Passage Way
Upon reaching Midland, our first stop was the Huronia Indian Village. Through a passage-way of logs, we went back in time more than three hundred years. A student from Western University, Rosemary Ball, told us many interesting things about the village and then we were permitted to roam about, snapping pictures, and trying our hand at grinding corn and Indian bowling. We found the longhouses with their fur beds, the smoke houses, the Medicine Man's hut, and the torture pole, all very intriguing.

Wildlife Displays
Next we visited the Huronia Museum. Downstairs were the Indian and wildlife displays, while upstairs was the pioneer section. We boys were lured to the ship models, the old guns and the rather ridiculous men's fashions of that time, while the girls congregated around the pioneer women's room and the souvenir counter. Something that impressed all of us was the diorama of the Indians' version of Christ's birth.

By now we had grown quite hungry so we stopped at Little Lake Park for lunch. We were given an hour to eat and to wander about the park. Some of us fed the seagulls.

In Awe
Soon with renewed vigour we were off to see the world-renowned Martyrs' Shrine and Fort Ste. Marie. Mouths opened in awe at the Shrine's splendour and we all listened attentively to Father Kanavy while he told us about the brave deeds of the martyrs. We then climbed to the top of Lookout hill and marvelled at the panoramic view over Georgian Bay. As we walked around the grounds we saw the fourteen bronze Stations of the Cross and enjoyed the lovely gardens. Across the road on the site of Fort Ste. Marie we found the grave of Father Brebeuf, first of the Jesuit Martyrs.
