Road Being Extended

A local company, Lyn-Dale Construction, who are doing the job, have been working on the site for the past week and already the changes are noticeable. Mounds have been pushed into hollows levelling the ground and a road is being constructed through the new area.

Seeded in Fall

Ornamental trees will be planted when the landscaping is completed and seeding is scheduled for the fall. George Muckart, the chairman of the cemetery board, has been supervising the work.

See Shoes, Dixie Cups Being Made Also Visit Pioneer Village

On Tuesday morning, June 20th, twenty-seven Institute members and nine visitors boarded a bus at Ashgrove for a day's outing. The first stop was at the Hewitson's shoe factory in Brampton where they saw shoes being made from start to finish and were told they make two thousand pairs a day. Next stop was the Dixie Cup. There are three such large industries and this they were told, is one of three in Canada. They make one million and a half cups a day. It was very interesting watching the way they are made and as each lady was leaving they were given a home dispenser full of Dixie cups for their kitchen. The ladies then went on to the Ascot Hotel near the new Woodbine race track for dinner which everyone enjoyed. In the afternoon the first stop was at the Pioneer Village at Edgely. The ladies saw the first home built by Daniel Stone in 1816 who came by covered wagon and consists of three rooms and a stone fireplace. Other buildings are the grain barn which has two huge mows, granary, sickle and cradle, a smoke-house, blacksmith and wheelwright shop and also the Gentleman's House, a fine example of a wealthy villager's home built in 1844. It was all very wonderful to look back into the past and see how they really lived and were happy. From there they went to the York Plaza for an hour's shopping and then through the city to the lake-front, where they boarded the boat for Centre Island, walked through the lovely park to a restaurant for supper, back on the boat again to the other side where the bus was waiting to take everyone home. Application forms for ONTARIO RETAIL SALES TAX VENDOR'S PERMIT should be returned by July 15, 1961 Official Permit Application Forms have been sent to over 120,000 Ontario vendors together with detailed information on the new Ontario Retail Sales Tax Act. These applications should be completed and returned by July 15th, so that vendors will receive their permits and additional information well in advance of September 1st, when the tax goes into effect. Who requires a vendor's permit? Every company or person, who in the ordinary course of his business sells goods to purchasers in Ontario, must have a sales tax vendor's permit. Restaurants and other premises selling prepared meals require a permit. Permits are also required by salesmen or manufacturer's agents who sell in Ontario for non-resident vendors not registered in Ontario. Vendors who have not received official Permit Application forms should send for one today!
